

The weather has been remarkably cool for the last week or two, owing to the wind blowing in from the sea. It has however been favorable to the crops, and very healthful. We hear good accounts from all parts of the country of all sorts of crops. There is every prospect that the year will be crowned with plenty and that the voice of joy and thankfulness will be heard throughout our land.

Canada, as well as the States, Northern and Middle, has, of late, been visited by violent tornadoes, some of them proving destructive to human life and to property. These have occurred, for the most part, in the fortnight between the 7th and 21st of June. Our readers will remember that, during the same period, we had similar, although milder visitants, commencing with the rather alarming squall which took place on the 8th June—the public holiday. The weather, all over the continent has been unusually cold and wet, although not sufficiently so to retard the growth of crops.

Col. Cumming has been appointed Governor of the Territory of Utah; and he, with his staff of judicial and civil officers, will proceed to Salt Lake Valley, during the current month. A body of troops, consisting of over 3000 men, under the command of General Harney, is under orders for the same destination, not, it is said, to make war upon the Mormons but to aid in compelling them to obey the laws.

Late advices from California state that the yield of the Gold Mines, this season, will be greater than was ever known before.

The Central Bank at Fredericton was broken into on Sunday night, the 28th ult., and robbed of about Five Thousand Pounds.

More than one half the Cable for spanning the Atlantic is now ready. Probably before the first of October next we will be in hourly communication with London.

Surely Sugar must come down. The crop of Porto Rico is said to be a million of pounds more this year than in 1856—of Molasses 220,000 gallons more—and of coffee 300,000 lbs. more.
