

The only disturbance in the neighbourhood took place at Agaparrah, about half-way between this and Barrackpore.

I began writing you an account by the last mail of this terrible outbreak in the Bengal Presidency, and I have determined to give you a brief outline of what further has been perpetrated, as Englishmen ought to be in possession of facts, lest there should be any squeamishness about the punishment in store for the brutal and diabolical murderers.

The cruelties committed by the wretches exceeds all belief. They took forty eight females, most of them girls from ten to fourteen, many delicately nurtured ladies—violated them, and kept them for the base purpose of the heads of the insurrection for a whole week.

We have at Bangalore a strong force, and the Madras Sepoys have hitherto proved loyal. There is one circumstance in our favour. We allow all our regiments to have their women and children with them in their lines, whereas in Bengal the Sepoy leaves his wife in his village, and is allowed to visit her for a certain period every year.

FRANCE. The Assemble Nationale, which has been suspended since the 8th July, has applied, by one of its redactors, to the Minister of the Interior, and the Chief of the Press Department has declared that the Government has resolved to suppress the title L'Assemble Nationale, and desires another name to be submitted to the Minister.

General D'Orgarie a friend of the Duc de Bordeaux, is said to have left France with several other young men of influence, for the purpose of leading on the rebels in India.

The minister of Marine has issued an order to all ships of war to give every aid to English ships conveying troops to India and to take them in tow when becalmed.

SWEDEN. A Stockholm letter says that the committee of legislation, composed of members of the Swedish Diet, has rejected by a majority of five the bill presented by the Government to the Chambers at the commencement of the Session for removing from the code the punishment of exile enacted against persons abjuring the Lutheran religion.
