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"The only disturbance in the neighbourhood took place at Agarparah, about half-way between this and Barrackpore. On the afternoon of Tuesday (23rd) a body of between two and three hundered Mussulmans rushed into the Government and Missionary Schools, shouting that the Company's raj (or reign) was now at an end, and ordering the teachers, on pain of death, to destroy their English books, and teach no more English in the Schools, but only the Koran. A violent affray with sticks, hamboos, and bricks, was the result; but though a great many heads were broken, no lives were lost. This was a fair indication of the spirit and determination of Mohammedanism generally; and clearly proves how little not only Christianity, but even western civilisation, has to expect from its intolerance, were it once to acquire the ascendancy in this land. The following letter is from a clergyman:-

" Bangalore, July 4. "I begun writing you an account by the last mail of this terrible outbreak in the Bengal Presidency, and I have determined to give you a brief outline of what further has been pernetrated, as Englishmen ought to be in possession of facts, lest there should be any squeamishness about the punishment in store for the brutal and diabolical mutineers.

"We have had an awful time of it, I assure you, though we ourselves have been mercifully kept from alarm or danger. No words can express the feelings of horror which pervades society in India, we hear so many private accounts of the tragedy, which are too sickening

"The cruelties committed by the wretches exceeds all belief. They took forty eight females, most of them girls from ten to fourteen, many delicately nurtured ladies-violated them, and kept them for the base purpose of the heads of the insurrection for a whole week. At the end of that time they made them strip themselves, and gave them up to the lowest of the people, to abuse in broad daylight the streets of Delhi. They then comleaving them to die. One lady was three days dying. They flayed the face of another lady, and made her walk naked through the street. Poor Mrs .---, the wife of an officer of the - Regiment at Meerut, was soon expecting her confinement. They violated her, then ripped her up, and, taking from her the unborn child, they cast it and her into the flames No Europeau man, woman, or child has had the slightest mercy shown them. I do not believe that the world ever witnessed more hellish torments than have been inflicted on our poor fellow country women. At Allahabad they have rivalled the atrocities of Delhi. I really cannot tell you the fearful cruelties these demons have been guilty of-cutting off the fingers and toes of little children, joint by joint, in sight of their parents, who were reserved for similar treatment afterwards.

We have at Bengalore a strong force, and the Madras Sepoys have hitherto proved loyal. There is one circumstance in our fayour. We allow all our regiments to have their women lage, and is allowed to visit her for a certain period every year. Our system, doubtless, is a great check on the Sepoys, as they know that, in the event of their rising, their families are in our power, but the Bengal soldiers can roam at will."

FRANCE.

The Assemblee Nationale, which has been suspended since the 8th July, has applied, by one of its redacteurs, to the Minister of the Interior, and the Chief of the Press Department has declared that the Government has resolved to suppress the title L' Assemblee Nationale, and desires another name to be submitted to the Minister. The new title has, in consequence been proposed, but as yet the Minister has not given his decision. It will be shortly announced under what name L' Assemblee Nationale will appear on the 8th of September.

General D'Organie a friend of the Duc de Bodeaux, is said to have left France with several other young men of influence, for the purpose of leading on the rebels in India. His hatred towards the British is stated to have been aroused by the neglect shown by the Queen to the Count of the Duc de Bordeaux when in London.

The minister of Marine has issued an order to all ships of war to give every aid to English ships conveying troops to India and to take D.D., of Rochester University. them in tow when becalmed.

SWEDEN.

A Stockholm letter says that the committee of legislation, composed of members of the legiste Course in the French Language." 
