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MISCELLANY.

PRINCE ALBERT,-At the Council which was held on Thursday, 24th ult, an order was passed for publishing a Letter Patent, by which the cheers of the populace. Queen grants to Prince Albert the title of Prince Consort" during their joint lives. This makes Prince Albert legally, as he already is actually, a member of the British Royal Family, Hitherto the Prince has had no British rank whatever. Prince Albert has hitherto borne only his German title, and out of England takes. we believe, according to the code of Court precedence, only his rank as a younger brother of a ducal German house. Prince Albert will now meet foreign Royal families with the status of a British prince of the highest rank.

The Warrington Guardian gives a long account of a trip from Warrington to London by the Rev. W. Quekett and 414 of his parishioners. They were in London for part of three days, saw the chief sights, and returned without a single mishap. The Rev. Gentleman is the one described, a few years ago, as the "Model Curate," in Dickens's " Household Words."

A fearful accident took place on Sunday night, about half-past ten o'clock, near the Lewisham station of the North Kent Railway. While an up train was stopping a short distance beyond the Lewisham station a train from Maidstone came up suddenly, and dashed into the stationary train. The lives of no less than twelve passengers have been sacrificed, and nearly forty persons are more or less injured.

Lord R. Grosvenor lately gave notice in the House of Commons that on an early day he would move an address to the Queen praying of its value, all within twenty miles of Boston. her Majesty to be pleased to appoint a commission for the purpose of examining the Liturgy of mouth. the Church of England, with a view to its improvement.

A hundred electric clocks are about to be established in Brussels. The municipal authorities have acquainted the inhabitants of some of the streets that the wires will run along the top of their houses, and call upon them to allow the workmen to make the necessary arrangements.
