We have had sent us for perusal a publication from the Boston Press, entitled the "Cloven Foot," being intended as a brief description of the various persecutions and acts of tyranny which have marked the progress of the church of Rome since its rise into power.

The Royal Mail Steamer America arrived on Thursday with the English Mails. The English papers are one and all wholly engrossed with the General Election, which was nearly completed, and had so far resulted in the return of a large majority of supporters of the Palmerston Ministry.

The breach appears to be widening between Austria and Sardinia; but it is not probable that the Great European Powers will suffer the differences between them to lead to open hostilities. In the latter country the great questions of civil and religious Reform, appears to be making favourable progress.

It now appears that the telegraphic news of the termination of the Chinese war was premature. Hostilities were still open at Canton, although the British Admiral was lying inactive with his squadron, waiting for reinforcements.

The general aspect of Europe, with the exception of Austria and Sardinia is pacific. The Legislature is still in session and it will be some days before a prorogation takes place.

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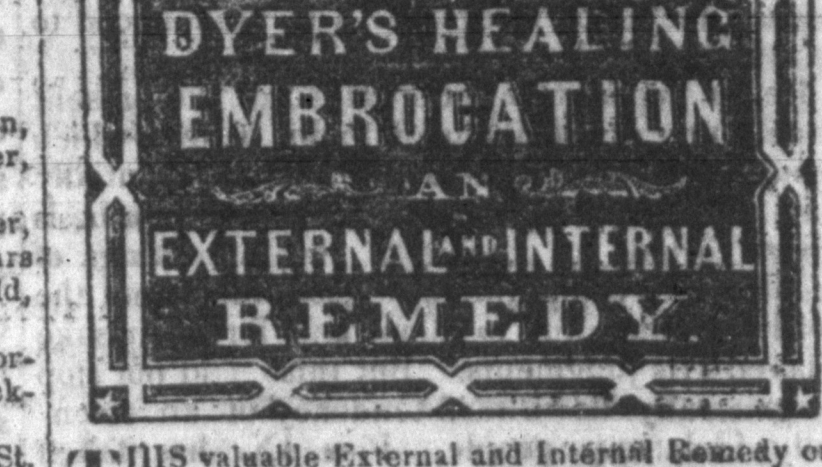
