A sailor was charged with taking away a horse and cart, driving it on the side-walk, and causing damage to property. He was under the influence of liquor at the time. Fine 10s. and damages.

A woman who had been brought on a truck, drunk, to the station, was sent to Bridewell. She had been before the court previously.

Saturday.—A woman, an old acquaintance at the police station, was brought up for disorderly conduct and using abusive language. Her excuse was intoxicating liquors.

Another woman was brought up for vagrancy. The mayor again referred to the melancholy case alluded to, and said that his not sending the poor creature to bridewell, instead of letting her go, had preyed on his mind since the occurrence. Sentence—10s. fine, and if found about the town after three hours, ninety days imprisonment.

A man, who was for many years sober and industrious and of very inoffensive character, was charged with stealing several pairs of socks from the country market. He pleaded guilty, and stated that he was in the "horrors" when he took the articles. The mayor remarked that it was the old story, and that drink, drink, drink, appeared to be the cause of nearly all the offences which called for the intervention of that court. Sentence—thirty days imprisonment.

DAY OF HUMILIATION.

From a Supplement to the London Gazette, of Friday, September 25.

BY THE QUEEN.

A Proclamation for a Day of Solemn Fast, Humiliation, and Prayer.

VICTORIA R.

We, taking into our most serious consideration the grievous mutiny and disturbances which have broken out in India, and putting our trust in Almighty God that he will graciously bless our efforts for the restoration of lawful authority in that country, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of our privy council, hereby command that a public day of solemn fast, humiliation and prayer be observed throughout those parts of our united kingdom called England and Ireland, on Wednesday, 7th day of October next, that so both we and our people may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of our sins, and, in the most devout and solemn manner, send up our prayers and supplications to the Divine Majesty for imploring His blessing and assistance on our arms for the restoration of tranquility; and we strictly charge and command that the same day be reverently and devoutly observed by our loving subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the favor of Almighty God; and, for the better and more orderly solemnising the same, we have given directions to the most reverend the archbishops and the right reverend the bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a form of prayer suitable to this occasion, to be used in all churches, chapels, and places of public worship, and take care that the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective dioceses.

Given at our court at Balmoral, this 24th day of September, in the year of our Lord, 1857, and in the 21st year of our reign.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN. [By a similar proclamation the same day is appointed for prayer in Scotland.]

BY HIS EXCELLENCY MAJOR GENERAL

HER Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, having appointed a day of fast, humiliation and prayer in the United Kingdom, in consequence of the calamitous events in India, and deeming it proper that her loyal subjects in Nova Scotia should unite in a similar observance, have resolved, and do, by the advice of the executive council, recommend that a public day of solemn fast, humiliation and prayer be observed throughout the province of Nova Scotia on FRIDAY, the 30th of October instant, that so we may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of our sins, and, in the most devout and solemn manner, send up our prayers and supplications, to the Divine Majesty for imploring His blessing and assistance on our arms for the restoration of tranquility.

The venerable the Archdeacon, in the absence of the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, will, as hath been usual on former occasions, compose a form of prayer suitable to this occasion, to be used in the church over which he presides.

Given under my hand and seal at arms, at Halifax, this twenty-first day of October, in the twenty-first year of her Majesty's reign A. D. 1857.
