SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The Annual Session of the Grand Division for this Province was held during the past week. A number of new members were initiated. Several measures connected with the progress of the order were brought forward, and after being fully discussed were adopted and put in operation. Some of the Divisions were reported as having had additions to their numbers and the cause generally was considered as affording ground of encouragement. The awful effects of intemperance becoming so flagrant is not the least ground of hope that the only effectual remedy—prohibition—will soon be demanded by all good citizens.

The Annual Session at Halifax, on the fourth Wednesday of October.

A Bazaar on a large scale is to be held in the Temperance Hall, on the 17th of December, for the purpose of raising funds for Temperance purposes. Contributions are expected from various parts of the country. We wish it all success.

ACADIA COLLEGE.—We learn that M. Peple, for some months past teacher of the French and German tongues in this city, has just been engaged as a Professor, or Teacher, of Modern Languages, at Acadia College, Wolfville. Every well-wisher of that institution must feel rather pleased at receipt of this scrap of intelligence. The want of a Tutor well qualified to give instruction in those languages of Modern Europe which are most in vogue among foreigners, has been seriously felt at Acadia College ever since it was founded. From what we can learn, we are inclined to believe that a happy selection of a Tutor has now been made. M. Peple is a Belgian by birth; and, like most of his educated fellow countrymen, speaks and writes French and German with equal facility and with great purity. A NEW BREAKWATER has just been completed at Lower Cove, South Joggins. During the summer some 100 men are employed here quarrying and manufacturing grindstones; about 30,000 are annually shipped to the United States.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A man named Smith, belonging to Cape George, was killed at the crossing opposite New Glasgow on Saturday last, under the following circumstances. As the train approached the crossing on its down trip, the deceased came out of a house on the west side of the track, and heedless of the warning whistle and the shouts of the engineer he attempted to cross in front of the train for the purpose of getting into the car on the opposite side, when he was knocked down, the wheels passed over his head, crushing him in a shocking manner, and killing him instantly. No blame attached to any person connected with the road. The train was not the regular one for taking passengers at the crossing, and was moving at the rate of speed usual at that place. It appears that the unfortunate deceased was so much under the influence of liquor as to be incapable of taking care of himself, or observing the warning given him.—Eastern Chronicle.
