#### FRANCE.

From France, we have news of the "conviction" of LEDRU RULLIN, MAZZINI. MASSARENTI, and CAMPANELLA, accused of having conspired for the destruction of the Emperor. THE EMPRESS AT A BULL-FIGHT.—On Sunday afternoon, near Bayonne, there was a bull fight, at which the French Court attended. The King of Wurtemberg and suite arrived at a quarter to four. The Empress, accompanied by the Duke and Duchess d'Albe, and by the members of her suite took her seat in the Imperial box at four. Two bulls were killed after the usual struggle, and amidst the applause of the spectators. 
