THE SEPOY MUTINY.

There is every indication that the present outbreak is looked upon as politically insignificant in India itself. That faithful barometer, as faithful in India as in England, the funds, shows by its rising that even the costs attendant upon suppression of the disturbance, is not expected materially to affect the revenue; and the journals, both English and native, exhibit no alarm whatever for the general safety of the empire.

On the cause of the uneasiness amongst the native soldiers, there is, naturally, some, though not much diversity of opinion. It seems clear that the greased cartridges were but a pretext; the first complained of had actually been made by native soldiers. It does appear that some vague, and, of course, groundless rumours had been disseminated among the soldiers, as to the intention of the Government to compel them to become Christians.

EDUCATIONAL AFFAIRS IN ENGLAND.

THE LATE CONFERENCE.

Deep interest has long been taken in this subject by certain classes and individual philanthropists. Of late, however, it has commanded the attention of those occupying the most exalted positions, and has assumed a more practical shape than ever before.

The following remarks from the Freeman will give our readers some idea of the recent Educational Conference held in London:

The meetings commenced under the presidency of the Prince Consort, as we suppose he is henceforth to be designated, the Earl of Granville taking the chair on the last day. Bishops and Lords, and a full complement of educational celebrities, were present and took part in the discussions, which were opened by a very sensible and comprehensive speech from the Prince, carried on the second day by sections in imitation of the meetings of the British association, and terminated on the third by votes taken on the reports of the sections.

Such free conferences on any subject are thoroughly in harmony with English habits, and if really free, have our cordial approbation.

The able speech of the Prince, exhibited but too plainly the two great difficulties which national education has to encounter. He enumerated not fewer than eight hostile parties, all viewing the subject from opposite and antagonistic positions, and ranged them very cleverly in pairs, of duellists, as it were, exhibiting but too hopelessly their political and religious antagonism. The favourite topics of each of these parties were especially interdicted by the Prince as incompatible with his presence amongst them.

Though the population has doubled during the last half-century, the schools, public and private, have been multiplied fourteen times. The attendance also upon the schools has increased from one in seventeen of the population in 1818, to one in eight in 1851, the date of the last census.

The demand of the poor is for an education which will be of practical use to the poor—to men-servants and to maid-servants; to work-men in the field and in the factory; to operatives of all classes who can never hope to rise above the class of operatives; hence the acceptableness of half-time schools and industrial schools.

The Yellow Fever has lately been raging at St. Thomas. A fire had occurred at Port au Prince, Hayti, on the 12th June, destroying 100 houses and stores containing merchandise to an immense amount. Col. Cummings has been appointed Governor of Utah, and his commission sent to him.

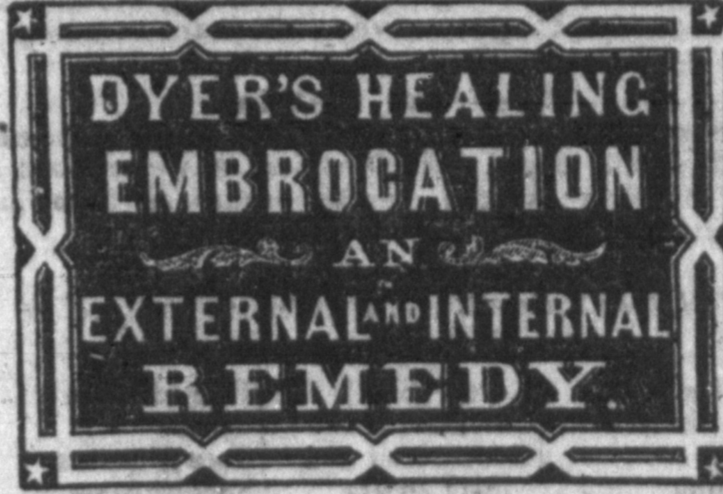
