

The crops of Apples in the U. States is expected to be very small. They are selling in the New York markets from \$3 to \$5 per barrel. Potatoes from \$2.50 to \$2.75.

Advices from Leavenworth, Kansas, state that much excitement exists there, growing out of the robbery and murder of a man named Stephens. Two men named Baines and Quarles were arrested, charged with the murder, and their confessions disclosed the existence of a regular organized band of robbers and murderers. Several apparently respectable citizens are implicated as confederates of the band. Baines and Quarles were hung under Lynch law.

THE CASE OF MRS. CUNNINGHAM.—Mrs Cunningham has been re-arrested, for attempting to produce a false heir to the Burdell estate. Since that time, Dr. Catlin, Mrs. Cunningham's physician, who was arrested as an accomplice, has turned State's evidence, and exposed the scheme in general and in detail. Justice Davison has refused to admit Mrs. Cunningham to bail, and she was to be locked up in the toms on Tuesday.—Ex.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA. BY HIS EXCELLENCY MAJOR GENERAL SIR JOHN GASPARD LEMARCHANT. Knight, Knight Commander of the Orders of Saint Ferdinand, and of Charles the Third of Spain, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, in and over Her Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia and its Dependencies, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS, late last night, or early this morning, the City Powder Magazine, in the North suburb of the City of Halifax, was destroyed by the explosion of the Gunpowder stored therein, causing the destruction of human life, and great injury to public and private property and alarm to the inhabitants of the city; and, whereas, there is reason to believe that the same resulted from the wilful and malicious act of some person or persons unknown; I do hereby offer and proclaim a reward of

FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS.

currency, to be paid to any person or persons (not concerned in the commission of the crime) who shall cause to be discovered or apprehended and brought to justice the offenders or any of them upon conviction. And all Her Majesty's loyal subjects are hereby enjoined and requested to aid in the premises to the utmost extent of their ability, and to disclose to the nearest Magistrate, or to His Worship the Mayor of Halifax, any information they may possess or receive in relation to the subject.
