Canada.

In the Canadian Parliament the subject of Seat of Government which has so long been matter of discussion, and has caused so much difficulty is again brought forward by the Hon. J. A. McDonald, Attorney General for Canada West. He has introduced three resolutions as follows :

1. Resolved—That the interests of Canada require that the Seat of the Provincial Government should be fixed at some certain place.

2. That the sum not exceeding the sum of £225,000 be appropriated for the purpose of providing for the necessary buildings and accommodations for the Government and the Legislature at that certain place.

3. That an humble Address be presented to her Majesty, praying that she may be graciously pleased to exercise the Royal Prerogative by the selection of some one place as the permanent Seat of Government in Canada.

Several amendments were made endeavouring to fit the place. The claims of Quebec, Montreal, Kingston and Ottawa were urged but without effect, and the above resolutions were passed by both the House of Assembly and the Legislative Council.

Notice has been given by Mr. Rankin that he will move for the consideration of the Union of the Colonies of British North America.

We understand that the Baptist denomination in this city, with a view of soon commencing the erection of a meeting-house in the neighborhood of the Marsh Bridge, have leased an eligible lot of land for the purpose from Henry Gilbert, Esq.—*St. John Courier.*
