WE learn by a communication from a friend at Truro, that the closing services connected with the Winter Session of the Normal School, took place last Wednesday and Thursday. The first day was devoted to a thorough testing of the literary qualification of the students, and the second to their professional attainments, both theoretical and practical. Never on a former occasion did the students display such an extent or diversity of knowledge, or such an acquaintance with the general business of their future calling. In the Model School some admirable specimens were furnished by the Pupil Teachers of their capability in reference to the practical education of the young.
