

ADDRESSES TO COLONEL HILL.—Much has been said in the City during the past week on the addresses presented to Colonel Hill, of the 63rd, who has been succeeded in his command; it is supposed in consequence of representations made at Headquarters by Sir Gaspard LeMarchant.

The first Address was from the Mayor and City Council; the second from citizens generally, numerous signed; and the third from the Union Fire Company.

The addresses were all highly complimentary and showed the warm interest each party felt in the gallant Colonel on his removal from this garrison, and the desire of again seeing him reinstated, and return to the same or a higher rank.

The Colonel's replies are fine specimens of a manly spirit and indicate a courage not likely to quail before an enemy either secret or open.

In our Obituary list will be seen the death of the Hon. James D. Harris. This is the fourth member of the Legislative Council and fifth of the Legislature who have died during the past year.

The Hon. Mr. Cutler has also been seriously indisposed, but is convalescent, Mr. Dimock we learn is improving.

A weekly religious paper has just been started in New York, under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association, called *The Way of Life*.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The MIC-MAC DIVISION held a public meeting on Monday evening last. It was intended to have been the closing one for the season.

A Division of the Sons of Temperance has been recently established at Chute's Cove.—*Bridgton Examiner*.

THE French War Steamer *Sesostrie*, Monsieur Cloue, Commander, arrived here on Tuesday last. This steamer is the smallest in size of the three comprising the fleet ordered to these waters to protect the Fisheries on the coast of Newfoundland, and the first that sailed from France for St. Pierre this spring.—*Cape Breton News*.

MORE INCENDIARISM.—An unsuccessful attempt was made, on Wednesday night, to burn the dwelling house of Mr. Daniel Gardner, on Huston Street. A small keg filled with combustibles was placed against the end of the porch in rear of the building, and ignited.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A correspondent at Shediac, under date of May 1, furnishes us with the following melancholy catastrophe:—

John McLaughlin, the brakeman, who was so badly injured on the railway near Shediac, died on the 26th instant. An inquest was held before Henry Livingstone, Esq., coroner, when the verdict of accidental death was returned.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—The Legislature of this colony have passed 22 bills during the session just closed. One provides for a retiring allowance of £275 a year each to two of the Judges of the Supreme Court, and another for the establishment of Normal School.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The Government, semi-official organ of St. John announces that James A. Harding, Esq., M. P. P. for the City of St. John and Speaker of the house of Assembly, has been made Sheriff of that county.

Large quantities of Gaspereaux have been taken in the harbour of St. John N. B.

Canada.—The Legislative Council of Canada has declared the seat of the Hon. D. B. Viger, a member of that body, vacant, in consequence of non-attendance.

MILITARY.—Detachments of the 100th regiment arrived from Montreal, making the number now in Quebec between seven and eight hundred men.

Mr. O'Farrell is expelled from the House of Assembly on motion of Mr. Cartier, for the infamous conduct proved against him at the late election.

The Commissioner of Crown Lands in Canada has introduced into Parliament a bill for giving bounties to Canadian subjects engaged in the seal, cod, mackerel and whale fisheries.

SUICIDE.—Henry William Herbert, an able writer in New York, well known as "Frank Forrester," committed suicide on the 17th. He was married about three months ago but had been recently separated from his wife. He is said to have been of irregular habits and ill-balanced mind.

The city of New Orleans was in danger of being overflowed on the 3rd inst. The river broke through the levee in a number of places, and flooded the streets in the vicinity of the breaks, but the levee was finally repaired.
