A telegraph line from Quebec to the Straits of Bellisle is in contemplation in Canada, in connection with the Canadian weekly line of steamers. By this means it is thought the earliest intelligence would be uniformly conveyed between Europe and America.

COAL IN THE VICINITY OF TRURO.—We are informed by a correspondent at Truro that a fine seam of coal has been recently opened at Salmon River, about 12 miles from Truro, on the Pictou road. A few individuals in Truro have recently associated themselves for the purpose of making further explorations; and the result has exceeded their most sanguine expectations.

The coal raised from the old shaft has been examined by several practical miners, and pronounced of a good quality. The success of these operations has created intense satisfaction in Colchester, and shares which were at five pounds at the outset, have been disposed of at an advance of £50, and as high as £100 have been offered for others. It is believed that the coal can be raised at 3s. 6d. per ton, and being within twenty feet of the public highway, will become available for general consumption in all the surrounding country.—Chron.

A novel boat race comes off at Chester tomorrow evening. The boats are to be rowed by females. One by Miss Kearney, Miss Richardson, Miss Smith and Miss Dimock. The other by Miss Garrison, Miss Barry, Miss Collins and Mrs. Nass. The umpire is Mr. Charles Church.—Liverpool Transcript.

PARTRIDGE ISLAND BATTERY.—The works connected with the new Battery at Partridge Island are rapidly progressing; a considerable portion of the pivot blocks and granite curbs are laid, and the interior sod work of the parapet is commenced. The battery when completed will mount five long sixty-eight pounder guns and five 8 inches guns, mounted on wooden traversing platforms. The guns will be fired through embrasures cut in the parapet, and not en barbette as in the old battery, Artillerymen are at present engaged in removing the old 24-pounder guns to the beach, for transmission to this city. It is expected that the whole of the works will be completed before the end of October.—St. John News.

HALIFAX YACHT CLUB.

AT the adjourned Special Meeting of the Club, held at Mason's Hall on Wednesday Evening, the 11th inst., the Commodore in the chair, the following Resolution (prepared and submitted by Dr. Cogswell, and seconded by Benjamin Wier, Esq., and passed unanimously) was ordered to be published in all the city papers:

Resolved, That the Halifax Yacht Club feel it their duty, on the eve of a Regatta, publicly to express their disapproval of betting in connection with sailing and rowing matches. They beg to remind the public that many popular amusements, designed for the promotion of health and cheerfulness, have fallen into discredit, in consequence of being made an excuse for gambling. Of these they need only mention horse-racing, which was formerly conducted in Halifax with much spirit, but is now entirely discontinued from the above and other allied causes. They are apprehensive that boat racing may share the same fate, unless sufficient care is taken to keep it true to its original design, as an exercise of noble rivalry calculated to excite a healthy interest in the public mind, and to foster skill in the serious pursuits of a manly people. The practice of racing for heavy stakes they consider also a species of gambling which they wish to discourage, considering that the amusement and the increase of bodily vigor attained in qualifying for the races ought to be sufficient to maintain the spirit of competition.
