

INDIA.

Mr. MONTGOMERY appears to be proceeding, on the whole, successfully in the pacification of Oude. He is restoring, and even greatly improving, Lucknow! causing it to present, in cleanliness, in the width of the streets, and in civil order, a comparatively European appearance, at the same time giving the garrison every advantage in the arrangement of the fortifications. Wherever the English troops passed, everything is as tranquil as if no rebellion had occurred. A very pleasing instance is recorded of the conversion of some forty natives to Christianity in the Meerut district itself, through some books left behind by a missionary who had been compelled to flee. It would seem that the natives are not rendered averse to Christianity by our success, but rather the contrary.

Telegram from Alexandria, Oct 11:—

The steamer Madras arrived at Suaz from Bombay yesterday, with dates to the 24th ultimo.

The disarmed troops at Mooltan, consisting of the 62nd and 69th Bengal Native Infantry, mutinied on the 31st August. Their almost total extermination was the consequence.

An officer and four men were killed in the outbreak.

Lieutenant-Colonel Robertson came up with the fugitives from Powre on the 5th September.

The rebels were defeated with great slaughter.

Four emissaries of the Nena have been captured at Gwalior, endeavouring to tamper with the 25th Bombay Native Infantry, who informed their officers of proceedings. The culprits were executed.

The Gwalior fugitives, under their leader, Tantia Topes, after their defeat by General Roberts, turned towards Malwa, and occupied the town of Jhalra Patun; the Rajah's troops deserting him, the rebels secured a large amount of treasure and about forty guns. The rebels were dispersed in all directions, and thirty guns captured, with trifling loss on our part.

UNTOWARD EVENTS.

A severe shock of an earthquake was felt in Calcutta at 3.30 p. m. on the 24th of August. Earthquakes in Bengal are always slight, but this one shook the houses visibly, and it is said by the natives to have been more severe than the one of 1842. The Supreme Court was shaken to such a degree that judge, bar, and prisoners rushed pell-mell out of the hall together. Yeh, in his great house at Alipore, was so frightened that, for the first time since he has been in Calcutta, he rushed into the open-air.

I have just received official intelligence of the outbreak of cholera in the Cashmere valley. The Maharajah reports that upwards of 100,000 of his subjects have perished in a few weeks. No burst of disease so tremendous has ever been known, even in India. Cause everywhere supposed to be drought, but the disease is marching on the plains.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

Sir John Lawrence was disbanding the disarmed regiments in the Punjab at the rate of twenty per day. They tried to corrupt the Sikhs, and he would bear the anxiety no longer.

The centre of the guerilla warfare between the Ganges and the Saone is still unapproachable but the Commander in Chief has ordered the collection of a force adequate to the work of clearance. Lucknow is being restored to more its ancient splendour, earth-works being removed, trenches filled up, broad roads constructed, new fortifications built, batteries mounted, and strict sanitary measures introduced. The discharge of the disarmed native regiments in the Punjab will release four European regiments, greatly required for other work. The re-arming of the one or two regiments will probably be abandoned on the news of the outbreak at Mooltan. Five hundred women and children died at Dumdum in a fortnight from overcrowding but every precaution has now been taken and the women distributed.

FRANCE.

The Moniteur says:—The (civil) marriage of his Excellency the Duke of Malakoff with Mademoiselle Valera de la Paniega was celebrated on Tuesday at five o'clock, by M. Frotin, the mayor of the 1st arrondissement, at his official residence. The religious ceremony was celebrated the same evening in the chapel of the Palace of St. Cloud, in the presence of their Majesties the Emperor and Empress, of his Imperial Highness Prince Jerome, his Imperial Highness Prince Napoleon, &c., &c.

The Duke and Duchess landed on Friday afternoon at Blackwall Pier. The vessel reached Blackwall Pier about half-past-two o'clock; and on the Duke and Duchess landing, they were cheered by a large crowd which had assembled on the pier. Their Excellencies immediately entered a carriage which was in waiting, and departed for their residence in London.

A rumour exists that the Emperor and Empress are going to pay a visit to the Pope in Rome, in March next. The Empress, it is said, made a vow long since to make a pilgrimage to Rome. It is said that on their return their Majesties will stay some time with the King of Sardinia, at Turin.

PRUSSIA.

A letter from Berlin of the 12th instant says:—The King has left, I am still under the emotion experienced on witnessing the departure. I can only write a few lines. Their Majesties the King and the Queen having left Potsdam, reached the station at half-past one. An immense crowd had assembled

and greeted the King with enthusiastic shouts of 'Long live the King!' The King, much moved, placed his hand on his heart and bowed repeatedly, saying, 'I thank you, my children!' There was not a dry eye at the station. It is impossible to describe the emotion of the Prince of Prussia. The Queen sobbed aloud, and every man present wept.

CHINA.

The advices by the China mail are satisfactory, owing to the recall of Hwang, the Governor of Canton, and the nomination to his post of one of the Plenipotentiaries by whom the recent treaty of peace was negotiated at Tien-Sin.

No doubt our forces will be obliged to co-operate with the Viceroy of Kwangtung before order will be restored completely at Canton, and we are convinced that Lord Elgin and Admiral Seymour will act with the sagacity and energy that have hitherto distinguished their operations when the proper moment shall have arrived. It is almost certain that both will await the cool season before they commence to carry out those measures which may be necessary to give us confirmed peace.

Lord Elgin had proceeded to Jeddo with the steam yacht, which he would present to the Emperor.

An expedition was about to proceed to the Sun-on and a seaman accompanying it killed. On August 11th the force composing the expedition arrived off Namtow, the town whence the attack on the party bearing the flag of truce was made. The forts were taken and destroyed, but the town was spared, at the solicitation of a deputation from the people.

AUSTRALIA.

Three nuggets, of the aggregate value of 14,000L., were being exhibited in Melbourne, previous to being shipped. These were taken out in the Ballarat district, and were about to be shipped to London. They are respectively named the "Welcome," the "Little Welcome," and the "Nil Desperandum." The first-named specimen, of pure gold, weighs over 2,100 ounces, and is of singular form, far eclipsing the glories of the once celebrated "Blanche Barkly" nugget.

AT NEW SOUTH WALES the Legislative Assembly has adopted a resolution in favour of the conveyance of immigrants into the interior at the public expense.

THE EARL OF SHAFTESBURY LISTENING TO A BAPTIST MINISTER AT THE FREE TRADE HALL.—The Earl of SHAFTESBURY has been presiding at a meeting of the Bible Society at Leeds. In the course of his speech he said:—

"He had passed the previous day in Manchester, which he had visited many years since, and he did not hesitate to say that the contrast between the Manchester of twenty years ago and the Manchester of the present day was most striking and most consolatory. (Hear, hear.) He attended a service which he supposed was unparalleled almost in the history of the world—undoubtedly it was unparalleled in the generation in which they lived—a service which was a combination of a lecture and a sermon, held in the Free Trade Hall, and presided over by a young Baptist minister named Mursell. There he saw assembled more than 6,000 of the working classes. He was struck by the fact, because the assembly had met at that particular hour of the day when they might reasonably suppose that working men were least of all disposed to give up their recreation and enjoyment. It was held at three o'clock in the afternoon, and to his astonishment he found them leaving their amusement and recreations, eagerly occupying every seat as fast as they could, and listening with attention and apparent devotion to that young lecturer. All these things were full of promise, and it was his firm belief that, if in this dense population large halls such as that could be opened on the Sabbath, and on week days, and be presided over by ministers who had the love of truth in their hearts, and a desire to do good to the people, with the power to convince their auditory that such love and desire existed, they might fill hundreds of halls scattered over the surface lying between Leeds and Manchester."

THE JEWISH CHILD.—The public excitement in Catholic France about the compulsory baptism of the child at Bologna is growing. The whole French press, with the exception of Ultramontane journals, is loud in condemning this tyrannical act. The Pope himself says it is an occurrence he bitterly regrets, though he feels himself unable to apply a remedy to it, as the rules of the Roman Church which refer to it do not admit of a double construction. In Holland as in Sardinia, public opinion has reverted to the affair of Mortara's child. The Amsterdam News asks its Government for direct interference.

Dr. Abial A. Cooley, the inventor of friction matches, died at Hartford, Conn., aged seventy-six. This is the simple announcement which the papers bring us of the death of an inventor whose genius has probably conduced as much to the conveniences of his fellow-men as that of any other inventor.

A letter from Constantinople states that Lord Stratford de Redcliffe died with the Sultan on the 4th, and Lady Redcliffe at the baron.

The process of raising the great Westminster bell goes on every day. It was expected to be completed on the 21st ult.

The Queen, with her husband, family, and suite, have returned to Windsor Castle.

The Olympic games, after being discontinued for fifteen hundred years, are re-established at Athens, in the ancient Stadium, by a decree of the Queen Regent of Greece.
