It says :--"Parents, in case their children shall not be baptized within one year after their birth, shall within that period give notice to the town clerk who shall keep a register of such birth &c"-and also directs that all such registrations shall be forwarded to the clerk of the peace in the county where he shall reside or officiate at the time, within ten days after the first day of January in each year.' One of these returns must be transmitted to "the Board of Registration and Statistics" at Halifax. To find out any such Board as this in Halifax we imagine would be no very easy task. The law also provides that "Any person neglecting to keep the register or make the returns &c. shall for each offence forfeit five pounds."

From the non-existence, as we believe, of any Board appointed to receive these returns we may conclude that no attention is paid to any of its other requirements. We do not suppose either that those who administer the ordinance of baptism, ever think of sending in returns of the same. Every clergyman, therefore, whether Episcopalian, Presbyterian, or Methodist, who administers baptism to infants is liable to a the Express, was also boarded about the same Bar Iron, com. fine of five pounds for not complying with its requisitions.
