Fearful Conflagration and Loss of Life. An alarm of fire was given last evening about

As usual, the fire companies and other citizens were immediately on hand, but before even any temporary check could be put to the devouring element, it had gained such an ascendency at the back part of the houses, that it became extremely perilous to those making efforts even to rescue the inmates. The fire appears to have originated in the rear of the premises occupied by Mr. Jonas Hagar, hatter. It appeared to make greater progress at first in the building in the occupation of Mr. W. S. Symonds & Co, stove and furnace dealers. The fire, however, in less than half an hour had enveloped the whole of the houses adjoining, and all the efforts were required to extinguish the fire on the opposite sides of the street-those of Mr. Wm. Ackhurst, Commission Port Williams. Merchant, and Albro & Co's. Hardware store. These were in imminent danger, and caught several times, and it was only by the most daring efforts of some of the courageous firemen that they were eventually saved.

The rapidity of the fire prevented the parties burnt out from saving scarcely anything.

A ladder was placed to the upper story of Mr. Gabriel's store, and Capt. Taylor endeavoured to drag out a person, whom he supposed to be Mr. Joseph Grant, but either from resistance on his part or his lameness, was unable to effect his rescue. The remains of his body were found this morning completely charred. Mr. Hagar was also by some means unable to escape, and his corpse also was discovered amongst the embers. Mrs. Grant, having thrown her child out of the window, jumped into the street, -both are badly injured-the former by both legs being broken, and is not expected to recover. Miss Ross and Miss Hagar both jumped from the second story and sustained injury,
