INDIA.

The Calcutta mail has arrived with private correspondence and files of papers from Calcutta to the 24th, of October.

The Times' Calcutta correspondent writes under date of October 24th, as follows :-

"The Queens's proclamation has arrived at last, and I am told will be published on the 1st of November, some delay being necessary to secure its simultaneous publication throughout the empire. Nothing is yet known of its contents, but it is universally believed that it comprises a wide, perhaps a general amnesty.

CHINA.

Up to the 4th of October nothing had been done, as the Commissioners required rest after their journey, and in addition were waiting for the arrival of Pootinqua from Canton, before proceeding to the revision of the tariff. It is supposed that the duties on tea and silk will remain unchanged, in spite of a strong feeling in favour of a reduction on the former article. Tue duty on imports will, however, be probably reduced as nearly as possible to a five per cent. ad valorem rate.

Lord Elgin is said to be "hand and glove' with the Shanghai Chamber of Commerce, and is acquiring great personal popularity in the

Nothing has been done at Shanghai for England in teas, but in silk there have been liberal purchases. For America there have been large investments in green teas, at extravagant prices. Canton is quiet.

A fearful tynoon passed over Swatow, commencing at 11 p. m on the 21st September. At 2 a. m. on the following morning, when the gale was at its height (bar, 28.41), a storm wave, twenty-five feet perpendicular, came in from seawards, sweeping everything before it, and driving the ships from their anchorage over a long mad flat, two miles across, with not more than two or three feet water on it. The tide rose from eighteen to twenty feet. It is said that upwards of 200 junks are wrecked and the loss of life amongst them is very great,

Those who have since visited the port say the scene is utterly beyond description. The destruction was complete. Among the Chinese the number of killed and drowned is not over estimated (according to The China Mail)

THE PRINCESS FREDERICK WILLIAM OF Paussia .- A Berlin letter of the 21st instant, says that the 18th birthday of the Princess Frederick William of Prussia was celebrated there with extraordinary rejoicings. It is remarked that her Royal Highness although somewhat pale, looked remarkably animated and happy. During the day her Royal Highness received a number of costly presents, many of which came from far distances. CONFERENCE RELATIVE TO THE REVISION OF THE LITURGY .- A Conference of clergy and distinguished laymen, which may fead to very important results, took place yesterday at the Caledonian Hotel, Adelphi. The Conference, which lasted several hours, was held for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of initiating forthwith a great national movement in favour of a revision of the Liturgy. It was resolved that large public meetings on the subject should be held in all parts of the country. It was also agreed that petitions to designs. Parliament, especially to the House of Commons, should be presented from all parts of the country, praying for Liturgical Revision .-Morning Advertiser.
