Latest Intelligence.

The Steamer City of Baltimore arrived off Cape Race on Friday, having left Liverpool on the 29th ult. with 100 passengers. Atlantic Telegraph shares £315 to £325. Gwalior rebels were defeated on the 17th of August, with 700 killed. British loss trifling. The Port of Pooree, after thirty hours' shelling, surrendered to Gen. Napier. On the 24th, a brilliant victory was obtained by 550 police over 4000 rebels. Three Bengal regiments have been re-armed. Punjab, Bombay, and Madras tranquil. Prince Napoleon had gone to Warsaw to invite the Emperor Alexander to Paris. The telegraph between St. Petersburg and Moscow is to be extended to the frontiers of China. Havre, Dunkirk, Calais and Boulogne are to be put in a state of defence. A port of refuge is to be constructed between Brest and Cherbourg.

Still Later.

The Cunard Steamship Africa arrived at New York on Friday last. Liverpool dates to 2nd instant. India and China mails reached London on the 2nd. No news of interest from India. The British Consul and all foreigners had left Canton. Lord Elgin and Admiral Seymour had gone to Japan. The ships Sultana and Ocean Chief (Am.) had arrived at Liverpool from Australia with £60,000 in gold. Nothing new regarding Atlantic Cable. Steamer Propellor arrived on the 29th at Galway, in a very leaky state—had to be grounded to prevent sinking. Galway Steamers hereafter to call at Newfoundland. Political news unimportant.

ARRIVAL OF THE "EUROPA."

The Royal Mail Steamer Europa arrived from Liverpool, G.B., at about 12 o'clock last night, with 160 passengers, 21 for Halifax. We find but little additional news. The Emperor of Russia replied to Prince Napoleon's invitation that he hoped to be able to visit the Emperor of the French and Queen Victoria in the Spring. More conflicts had taken place at Rome, between the French troops and the soldiers of the Pope. Some trouble is feared between France and Portugal, respecting the seizure of a slaver. It is said that Portugal is countenanced in her position by England. It is so far serious. Lord Stratford de Redcliffe had presented an autograph letter from Queen Victoria to the Turkish Sultan, inviting him to receive particular communications.

General Intelligence.

Foreign and Domestic.

The Halifax CITY COUNCIL met on Friday last, and re-elected the CITY OFFICERS for the ensuing year. A change was made in only one—the keeper of the Market. DENTISTRY EXTRAORDINARY.—On Friday night last some person or persons extracted the large golden tooth from its iron bracket hung over Drs. Macallaster & Paine's door. As it is valuable only to the owners, they hope the parties borrowing it will replace it as soon as convenient. A meeting of the Subscribers to the GENERAL WILLIAMS PORTRAIT FUND was held on Wednesday last, when a committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements with the General, &c. THE RAILWAY BOARD have introduced CHECKS for luggage. It is said that the SIGNAL STATION at the Citadel is to be revived. Excavations have been begun in the Governor's field for the foundation of the new Court House. The MARINE RAILWAY at Dartmouth is being rapidly proceeded with, and will soon be ready for use. The track is 600 feet in length, 420 of which are to be under water. A vessel of from 10 to 1500 tons may be run up from the water upon it. Vessels are for the present to be drawn up by horse power. A correspondent of the Morning Journal says, 26 vessels have been built in Lunenburg County since last April, and that 22 are now on the stocks. An Educational meeting was held in Pictou on the 4th inst., without any beneficial result.—Journal. Why? The town of Yarmouth is to provide £300 for sinking tanks, purchasing hose, and other apparatus.

A WOMAN SHOT ON THE COMMON.—On Friday morning last three women of bad character were on the common, in company with three or four Marines, when Mr. Adamore, passing with a gun, was accosted by them and pressed to take a drink of beer with them. While doing so one of the Marines named Archibald Downey took the gun, and, although warned that it was loaded, discharged it at one of the women named Mary Ann Stevens. The shot struck her in the face, and blew off one side of her head and face. She died a few hours after. Downey was taken into custody, and a coroner's inquest held on the body on Saturday, and again on Monday. There appears from the evidence to have been no malice intended. The Captain of the Marines gave Downey a good character for the two years he had served on board the Indus. The Coroner, Dr. Jennings, summed up the evidence, and the Jury, after brief deliberation, returned a verdict of "Accidental Death."

SUICIDE.—On Saturday night a man named John Fitzgerald was found drunk in the streets and was put in the lockup. When the door was opened in the morning he was found dead—suspended by his scarf to the iron bars of the window. A coroner's inquest was held, and brought in a verdict in accordance with the facts.

The body of a man was found on Sunday morning on the south side of George's Island, supposed to be the person drowned from a vessel belonging to Cliester some time ago.

A boat with three fishermen was upset at Ketch Harbour on Thursday morning last. Two of them, Thomas Fleming and Peter Brooks, were drowned. William Pettipas swam until rescued.

The Chronicle tells of a "row" which happened this day week at the Windsor Junction between a number of Irish navvies and some farmers in the train. No great injury was done.—Pres. Witness.

A TEA MEETING AT WILMOT came off on Wednesday last, the 6th inst. About 800 people, old and young, were present. Every one seemed to enjoy the occasion very much. The proceeds amounted to about £53.

The railroad is rapidly progressing to completion as far as Truro; and we have the authority of a gentleman well versed in railroad affairs, for saying that the line to Truro will undoubtedly be open for traffic by the first of December next.—Colonial Standard.

The Coal-Trade from this Port appears to be closed for the present season. For the past two months the shipments have been very limited, and the freights unremunerative.

The amount of coal shipped the present year, we understand, is considerably less than that of last year, and the vessels now in port are unable to obtain charters.—Ib.
