General Intelligence.

Foreign and Domestic.

It is rumoured in the city that the Hon. Joseph Howe is employed on one of the New York newspapers at a salary of \$4000 a year.

A house at the N. W. Arm, belonging to Mr. Gwatkin, was destroyed by fire on Wednesday night last. It is supposed to have been by an act of incendiarism.

THE LUNATIC ASYLUM is expected to be ready for opening about the beginning of the year.

THE RAILROAD.—An extension of the Truro line is expected to be opened next week.

At the lecture last week by Rev. Dr. Robertson, the chairman, J. G. A. Creighton, Esq., spoke of the profligacy which so fearfully prevailed, and of "the dejection where it was least to have been expected," over which they had to mourn. The meeting was opened by prayer by the Rev. W. H. Humphrey, and closed by the Rev. R. F. Uniacke.

The house of Mr. George Bowes, Maitland street, was entered by thieves about 12 o'clock on Monday night, who were in a fair way of succeeding in their designs, when they became alarmed at the approach of a citizen who was passing by. They had removed a desk containing a sum of money from the parlor to the cellar, but had not time to open it and get possession of contents, before they took the alarm and fled.—Chronicle.

An attempt was made on Wednesday night or Thursday morning to break into the Counting Room of Messrs. Oxley & Co., but the windows were too securely fastened, and the scamps decamped empty handed.—Journal.

"GENERAL WILLIAMS AT HOME."—On Thursday the 4th inst. the gallant 'Hero of Kears' arrived at Digby, in the Emperor, from St. John N. B., and after being introduced to several ladies and gentlemen of that town, proceeded to Annapolis—the place of his nativity—in the steamer Experiment; where he reached about 2 o'clock P. M. He was received with great pleasure and cordiality by a large number of those who had been well known to him in the days of his boyhood. The Volunteer Artillery announced his arrival by a salute of 13 guns. Festoons of flags and arches of evergreens, with appropriate mottoes, were thrown across the street. Over the entrance to the house in which he was born was the beautiful but simple one, "Welcome Home."

On Saturday a public meeting was held in the Court House, when an address was presented to the General, and a suitable reply given, in which personal friendship and loyalty to the Sovereign were the prominent subjects. A display of fireworks &c. were given in the evening. The General left on Monday, and returned to St. John, where a grand ball was given by the citizens. General Williams is expected to leave for England in the Cunard Steamer to-morrow night.
