DEAF AND DUMB SCHOOL.—The Bazaar in behalf of this Institution on Thursday last was any thing but a Deaf and Dumb affair. What with newspaper paragraphs before and after the event, the benevolent ladies who have been so industriously working for it, the thousands who went through the mud to attend it, and the poor children who came near being smothered, and we have enough for a considerable amount of talking. Many tried to get in, but were unable. Had it been summer time the inconvenience would have been much greater. The pupils of the School too, were there a portion of the day, and they too talked with each other and with some of the visitors, by means of the fingers. It is gratifying to learn that the effort realized upwards of £400. Had the place been more commodious the sum would doubtless have been very much larger.

HIS EXCELLENCY, EARL MULGRAVE, and the COUNTESS have lately afforded much gratification to the managers of the two most popular of our public Schools in the city, the ROYAL ACADIAN and the NATIONAL, by paying them each a visit during the past week. The reports of these visits show that the efficiency of these institutions afforded much satisfaction to their distinguished visitors.

A large number of ladies and gentlemen were also in attendance. The brief examination at each called forth the admiration of all present. We are informed it is proposed that a holiday be given to these schools at the end of January, to be called "the Governor's holiday," for the purpose of the pupils enjoying a skating match.

OUR MARKETS have been most abundantly supplied during the past week. The early setting in of winter induced many of our farmers both east and west to hasten the sending on of their mutton and pork. This has caused a somewhat dull sale. The railroad has afforded facilities for travelling. One train from Truro had upon it forty teams laden with farm produce.

GENERAL WILLIAMS arrived in the city on Monday forenoon. We understand he will stay with the Rev. Dr. Twining whilst he remains in Halifax.

The Governors of King's College were summoned to meet at Windsor yesterday for the purpose of conferring the honorary degree of Doctor in Civil Law on General Williams.

SACKVILLE, N. S.—The Rev. T. H. Porter, in a letter to the Journal of Education, respecting a School meeting recently held in that locality, gives the following list of resolutions which were passed:—

- 1st. That the school be continued another year.
2nd. That Dr. Dakin be the teacher.
3rd. That he receive £125, inclusive of Provincial allowance, for his services.
4th. That the salary be raised by voluntary subscription.
5th. That the salary be paid quarterly in advance.
6th. That they do all in their power to keep up the respectability of the school.
7th. That there be suitable provision made for warming and cleaning the house—the contract taken by the lowest tender, the expenses of which to be paid proportionably by the scholars.

These (with others) were moved, seconded, and spoken to by a number of gentlemen present with telling effect, without a discordant voice.

LORD BURY IN CANADA.—At a dinner given by the citizens of Toronto to Lord Bury, on the 12th ult., after passing a high eulogium on the evidences of progress in those Provinces, he referred to the proposed Railroad from Halifax to Quebec as one of the things essential to their future development. He also alluded to the question of the representation of the colonies in the Imperial Parliament. He considered it might be more efficiently secured by the creation of new members of the House of Lords—life peersages—on behalf of the colonies, than by representatives in the Commons.
