ARRIVAL OF THE "EUROPA."

FRANCE.

In the celebrated essay which has drawn upon him the wrath of the French Government, M. de Montalembert declares the Roman Catholic Church to be more free in England and Ireland than in any other part of the world; and, per contra, no nation to be so grossly insulted as the British by the Catholic journals of France, Belgium, and Italy. He passes an eloquent eulogy upon Havelock-"a personage of antique grandeur, resembling in all that was noblest in the type, the great Puritans of the seventeenth century-occupied in his last moments as he had been all his life, with the care of his soul and the propagation of Christianity-a figure worthy to head a group of heroes, such as Nicholson, Neil, Lawrence, Peel, the son of the great Sir Robert-victors in a struggle between civilization and barbarism-strangers to no Christian people-to be admired by all without restriction or reserve -an honour to the human race." "I have a horror," he exclaims, "of orthodoxy which takes no account of truth or justice." To accusations of neglect of duty against England and Protestantism, the retort, he says, is only too plain. Tantia entered there on the 9th of October, Captain Fenton and the police evacuating six hours before. General Mitchell afterwards encountered the enemy at Moorgow Dey, and again at Scindwas, on the 19th of October, entirely routing him, and capturing all his guns. Want of cavalry alone has prevented the total destruction of this formidable mass of encampments, still estimated to be 14,000 strong. The difficulty is now being remedied by some valuable levies of Southern Mahrutta Horse.

Successful actions were fought near Lucknow on the 4th, 5th, and 8th of October, in which the rebels, described as utterly purposeless and disorganised, are said to have been destroyed in

"The Kapoorthalla Contingent have again distinguished themselves in an attack on the town of Bundooree, near Bairam Ghaut, on Gogra River: 400 of the rebels were killed, without any loss on our side.

A force from Shahjehanpore, under Sir T. Seaton, encountered a body of rebels at the village of Bangamaon, on the Oude frontier, on the 8th of October, took two guns out of three, and killed 300 men. Our loss, about 12 killed and wounded. On the same day another body of rebels attacked Powaeen, but were repulsed.

A force was despatched from Sultanpoor on the 20th of October to Daodpoor, where it completely defeated the Nusseerabad rehels' brigade, taking three guns, three elephants, and all the enemy's materials. The f rt of Burrrh was taken on the 21st. The British loss on these occasions amounted to about forty wounded and a few killed.
