ARRIVAL OF THE "EUROPA."

FRANCE.

In the celebrated essay which has drawn upon him the wrath of the French Government, M. de Montalembert declares the Roman Catholic Church to be more free in England and Ireland than in any other part of the world; and, per contra, no nation to be so grossly insulted as the British by the Catholic journals of France, Belgium, and Italy.

The trial of Count de Montalembert stood fixed for Wednesday the 17th ult., before the sixth chamber of the correctional tribunal. M. Bertelin is to be the presiding judge. The Procureur Imperial, Cordouan, is to conduct the prosecution in person.

PORTUGAL.

The King of Portugal, accompanied by her Majesty the Queen, opened the Cortes on the 4th inst. with a very short speech, containing the following reference to the recent disgraceful proceedings of the French: "Friendly relations have not (since last session) been interrupted with the nations with whom we are allied."

INDIA.

"Another detachment of Tantia's troops attacked Chandere, and were met by Scindie's troops, the fight lasting three days, and it is reported the rebels lost 800 men. Tantia entered there on the 9th of October, Captain Fenton and the police evacuating six hours before.

Successful actions were fought near Lucknow on the 4th, 5th, and 8th of October, in which the rebels, described as utterly purposeless and disorganised, are said to have been destroyed in great numbers.

"The Bombay newspapers report that in spite of the disturbances, the country continues to enjoy an extraordinary degree of commercial prosperity, and that the trade is increasing in amount, and improving in profitability, at a rate almost incredible.

"ODES—The following events have occurred in Oude since the date of my last message, on the 4th of October:—The rebels had advanced on Sandella with 12,000 men and 12 guns. Captain Dawson entered a fortified enclosure with 1,400 police infantry, sending back his 500 cavalry to Malleabad.

for ten miles, and 1,000 rebels were killed. Our loss—European, two officers and seven privates wounded; police, four killed and forty-four wounded. On the 5th of October Brigadier Eveleigh encountered a body of rebels at Meeahunge, near the Cawnpore road, took two guns, and killed and wounded 200 men.

"The Kapoorthalla Contingent have again distinguished themselves in an attack on the town of Bandooree, near Bairam Ghaut, on Gogra River; 400 of the rebels were killed, without any loss on our side.

A force from Shahjehanpore, under Sir T. Seaton, encountered a body of rebels at the village of Bangamaon, on the Oude frontier, on the 8th of October, took two guns out of three, and killed 300 men. Our loss, about 12 killed and wounded. On the same day another body of rebels attacked Powaeen, but were repulsed.

A force was despatched from Sultanpore on the 20th of October to Daodpore, where it completely defeated the Nusseerabad rebels' brigade, taking three guns, three elephants, and all the enemy's materials. The first of Barrh was taken on the 21st. The British loss on these occasions amounted to about forty wounded and a few killed.

The Deputy Magistrate of Sassaram reports that the column under Colonel Turner engaged a body of the enemy at the village of Baja (?), Captain Sir H. Havelock at the same time pressing their rear with his cavalry. The enemy was completely routed, losing 500 in killed; the British, one officer killed and two wounded, and seven or eight men killed and wounded.

On the 9th of October the Mhow field force, under the command of Major-General Michell, surprised near the town of Mongrenlie a body of the Gwalior rebels, numbering from 4,000 to 5,000, and utterly defeated them, taking their six guns; the British loss very trifling. On the 12th of October the force under Brigadier Smith joined that of Major-General Michell, and on the 19th the combined force came upon the enemy, 10,000 strong, at Saiswa (?), south-east from Chundalee, and totally routed him, with a loss of 500 killed and all his guns.

PREPARATIONS FOR THE QUEEN'S PROCLAMATION IN INDIA.—Preparations were being made in Calcutta, when the last mail left, for ushering in the proclamation of the Queen's authority with becoming ceremony. All the public offices were to be illuminated.

NEWS FOR THE LADIES.—The Paris correspondent of the Press has heard, "on excellent authority," that the Empress and some of her ladies have lately been engaged in making all manner of experiments on dress as regards form and development, and colour; and that the result is "that they have determined before long to inaugurate a violent reaction to the present style—that is to say, to have dresses short enough to display the foot and ankle, instead of trailing on the ground; to diminish immensely their prodigious development; and in place of more or less staid, to have the brightest and gayest hues imaginable."

THE DUKE AND DUCHESS OF MALAKHOFF AT MASS.—The Duke and Duchess of Malakhoff attended the service of the Roman Catholic Chapel near Portman-square, on Sunday morning (17th inst). The Duke was dressed in plain clothes, rendered rather conspicuous by his bright yellow silk gloves, but from some unexplained cause, the eloquence of the minister had little means of taking effect upon him, as he slept throughout the whole service, greatly to the apparent annoyance of his fair bride.

THE CONVICT BANKERS.—We understand that Mr. Bates has been released after an imprisonment of three years. Sir John Dean Paul and Strahan lie prostrated in the infirmaries of their respective prisons.

M. DE LAMARTINE.—A letter from Macon (in Galignani) mentions that the estate of Milly, belonging to M. de Lamartine, has been sold to a landed proprietor at Bordeaux for 675,000fr.

NEW WAY OF PRESERVING THE PEACE.—On Sunday night last, about thirty youths, with some women, had formed themselves round a ring opposite the beer-house, Embury, encouraging two youths to fight, when a servant girl, passing on her way to chapel, rushed into the arena, and by her persuasive powers succeeded in taking most of them to chapel with her.
