THE GREAT STEAMSHIP CALAMITY.—TWENTY-TWO ADDITIONAL SURVIVORS.—Quebec, Oct. 4.—The Norwegian ship Catarina, Capt. Funne-mark, from Forney, 43 days out, arrived yesterday. She reports:—On the 14th September, at 2 o'clock, A. M., in lon. 44 40, lat 41 39, the Catarina fell in with the unfortunate steamship Austria, and took from the wreck 22 persons, in all—16 passengers and 6 of the crew. In the number is included a girl about 14 years of age.

On their arrival at this port, Messrs. Falkenburg & McBlain took them under their care and will see to their wants.

THE CANADIAN FAIR.—A Telegram from Toronto, dated Sept. 29, says the Provincial Fair was formally opened at noon on the same day, by Sir Edmund Head, in the Crystal Palace, erected for the purpose.—The number of entries are larger than for any year previous, and the exhibition generally, is far ahead of previous ones.—Lord Napier, who was to officiate at the opening, telegraphed at the last moment, saying it was impossible for him to come. The city is full of people. The weather is fine.

The Rev. K. A. Fyfe, the pastor of the Baptist Church in Toronto, has received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity, from the Senatus Academicus of Madison University.

CANADA BARLEY.—Mr. Goddard, of Lewiston, lately harvested from a bushel and a half of sowing, fifty-three bushels of barley. The seed came from Canada.—Maine paper.
