CHINA.

The Post's Paris correspondence writes that official despatches have reached Paris, from which it is concluded that the Chinese Government desires peace.

The supply of money in England keeps large, and a better demand has arisen for commercial purposes.

The weather for the previous week had been all that could be desired, and the harvest was making rapid progress to a satisfactory termination.

Transactions in the Provision market have been on a limited scale, prices, however, have been well sustained.

We understand that the Rev. Dr. Hannan has been elected Administrator of the Diocese of Halifax, until a successor to the Archbishop is appointed.

Mr. Hutton, principal of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, has lately visited Charlotte Town, P. E. I., Tatmagouch, River John, Wallace, Pugwash, Amherst, and Sackville, N. B.

On Monday morning last, a little boy about ten years old, while playing on the Market slip, fell in and in all probability would have been drowned.

The late damp weather has, we fear, prevented many from securing their hay crop free from injury.

The small amount of \$25,000 in Gold, which has come forward from Frazar River, does not indicate a realization of the glowing accounts of the abundance of gold in that region.

At the Albion Mines, last week, two men named George Redpath and Russell were killed by the explosion of a fire-lamp.

The Post Office authorities have invited tenders for conveying the Mails between Windsor, Kentville, and Annapolis.

It is thought that the Atlantic Telegraph will not be available for at least five weeks.

A line of steamers now run between Boston and New York, leaving Boston on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

We regret to notice in the Liverpool Transcript that the "blight" has again struck the potatoes in Queen's County.

We observe that the Iron Steamer Queen Victoria has taken the place of the Lady Head, between Quebec and Pictou.

We learn from the Eastern Chronicle that a fine Steam Mill establishment, owned by Messrs. Blackmore & Henry, at River John, was burned to the ground on the 7th inst.

Another link in the Great Telegraph Chain.—We learn that the Company which was formed last year for the purpose of establishing telegraphic communication between the Island of Cuba and the American continent, have completed their preliminary arrangements.

Great enthusiasm was manifested at Fredericton, N. B., when it was announced that the Queen's Message had passed over the wires.

We learn from the Niagara Falls Gazette, that Canadian engineers have been making surveys within a few days, for a tubular bridge across the Niagara at that place.

It is stated that the Queen will make an extensive tour through Ireland next summer.

The amount contributed to all the Missionary Benevolent Societies in Great Britain last year, was about one million pounds, or five million of dollars.

A great tubular iron bridge is now being constructed at Newcastle, England, and will be completed in about two years.
