Complaints have reached us that breaches of the fishery laws are now being made with impunity in some of our rivers to the westward, and principally by strangers, who visit those places determined to take salmon by any means,—the spear and the bug-net have both been in requisition this last week. The Inland Fishery Company cannot do the good they would wish for the want of funds. But as the Legislature refused the usual allowance to the Wardens, and left the matter almost wholly to the Sessions, the attention of the Custoses should be called to the matter, by the government.—Sun.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—We regret to learn from a despatch to the morning papers that on the 1st inst., "as Mr. Thomas Hardy, School Teacher, and a Mrs. Morton, were crossing Cornwallis Toll Bridge, in a carriage, the horse took fright and backed off the bridge, precipitating all into the river. Mrs. Morton was with difficulty rescued, but Mr. Hardy was unfortunately drowned. The horse was also killed."
