

FATAL ACCIDENT AT TRURO.—A man buried in a well.—A coroner's inquest was held over the body of Mr. William Smith, a very promising young man, about 28 years old, and a son of Mr. Robert H. Smith of this place.

The deceased undertook yesterday afternoon to set a pump for Mr. Gunn. This well is 29 feet deep. The lower joint being deposited, he went down to secure it, and in the act of connecting the two pieces, the stones gave way at his feet, he seized the pump, and grasped the chain, endeavoured to make the top, his feet became involved in the falling stones and earth.

This sad accident will be a warning here in many respects. The well was just finished. The man who built the well was repeatedly told that his work was not good, and one person stated that it would be the death of some one, but little thought his words would be verified before two short hours.

Death, industrious, never forgetful, is making himself known here at present. Three of his subjects now lie clothed in his habiliments awaiting interment. A son of Mr. G. W. Yuill, of sore throat. The Lantern is erected on a square tower attached to the main building, and will show a plain White Light, about 75 feet above high water level, and visible from all points of approach. The Tower and Building attached are painted White. The following are the bearings and distances of the most prominent points in the vicinity of "Burnt Coat Head":—

Cape Blowmedon, N. 70. W. 26 1/2 10 miles. Brick Kiln Ledges, N. 52. W. 7 1/2 10 miles. Economy Point, N. 36. W. 3 9-10 miles.
