This well prepared the crowded audience to appreciate the labours of those who by such unwearying exertion have succeeded in reaching the mind by the other avenue—the eye. The mode of teaching was beautifully illustrated, and afforded complete satisfaction to all present. It was pleasing to see the amount of interest awakened in this unfortunate class. The Governors of the Institution, Rev. Mr. Cochran, A. Mackinlay, John Duffus, and John Taylor, Esqrs., were present, and showed their warm interest in the pupils. PROTESTANT ORPHAN'S HOME.—A large meeting was held in the new house intended for this Institution. Mr. Cunard stated that since he and Mr. and Miss Cogswell had agreed to purchase the house for £1500, he had received a list of subscriptions amounting to £2800, which would probably be further increased. It was therefore decided that instead of their holding the house, and allowing it to be used for the purposes of the institution, they would each give £250 towards its purchase.

The Journal says:—"A resolution is before the City Council requiring all houses in the city which have not been painted for the last few years, to undergo that process in the course of the summer. The chief fault we have to find with it is that it was not passed a hundred years ago. A man has no more moral right to keep his premises an eyesore and disgrace to his fellow citizens, than he has to go in rags when he can afford to wear a good coat."

THE FINEST HARBOURS.—At a meeting of the London Geographical Society, Lord Bury said he considered the discovery of the two passes through the Rocky mountains as most important, as they promised to open a direct practicable route across the British possessions in North America. He expresses a hope that through one or other of them, a carriage road at least, if not a railroad, would be constructed to connect the two finest harbours in the world—that in Vancouver's Island and Halifax.—1b.

New Brunswick.

THE LEGISLATURE.—The motion for removing the Postmaster General from the Legislature was postponed for three months by a vote of 26 to 11.

The Rev. Mr. Ketchum, Chaplain to the House of Assembly, having resigned his office, the Rev. Mr. Brewster (Wesleyan) and the Rev. Mr. Coster (Episcopal) were nominated. On a division the latter was elected by 22 against 16.

The Hon. Mr. Tilley proposes to meet the deficiency in the Revenue by increasing the duties on "unenumerated articles," from 10 to 12 1/2 per cent.

Mr. McPhelin introduced a Bill to amend the Law relating to the Judges of the Supreme Court, providing for their qualifications and on a joint address of both houses of Legislature to remove them from the bench.

The Church Witness says the real author of this measure is no doubt Bishop Conolly, and the real object of it is—the removal of Judge Wilmot.

On Monday the 7th, the House in Committee of Supply, appropriated £5,865 for Legislative expenses, and £35,350 for the public works, besides other large sums for various purposes.

Mr. Tibbets gave notice of motion to rescind the resolution for the extension of Railways above Fredericton and in lieu thereof to commence active operations between the Canadian line and Woodstock, and to encourage the extension of the St. Andrews and Quebec line.

Mr. Grey's bill to enable parties to prosecute their claims against the Province, was discussed on Tuesday.

It was stated in reply to a question put by Mr. Allen that the resignation of the Hon. J. M. Johnson had been accepted.

The merchants of St. John have agreed to take the Sovereign for 24s. 4d. only.

Bishop Conolly intimates in a letter to the St. John Freeman that Mr. Maturin may be expected in that city soon, when the people of St. John will have the advantage of hearing his explanations from his own lips.

NEW BRUNSWICK DEBENTURES.—The upward tendency of Colonial as compared with United States securities, is made subject of remark in the New York papers. It is stated that while United States six per cent. bonds realize no premium, or at most a premium of two per cent, similar New Brunswick bonds range from eleven to twelve per cent. Some of the Western States are borrowing money at a discount in some cases of 18 per cent. The Albion finds in these circumstances an argument in favour of British connexion, and does not wonder that Maine should be, as it is alleged, not much averse to a political connexion with Canada.—Colonial Presbyterian.

EXECUTION OF MURDERERS.—Toronto, March 4.—The execution of Fleming, the Telegraph operator, and O'Leary, who were both found guilty at the last Assizes, took place to-day in presence of a vast number of spectators. O'Leary was attended by a Catholic clergyman, and read a short confession on the gallows. Fleming was attended by a Protestant clergyman. He met his end calmly and without bravado, and gave the clergyman a short account, in writing, of the crime, attributing his ruin to bad company and drink.

It is rumored that Sir Edward Lytton Bulwer is to succeed Sir Edmund Head as Governor General of Canada.

A new Saving's Bank building is to be erected in Montreal at a cost of £10,000.

United States.

THE MURDER AT WASHINGTON.—We made a slight mistake in our last, with reference to this dreadful affair. Mr. Key was the murdered man and Mr. Sickels the murderer, instead of vice versa as we stated. Mrs. Sickels is the daughter of an Italian lady, and very beautiful. Her husband, on her admission of her infidelity, commanded her to send to her mother in New York to take her away immediately, and demanded her wedding ring. Mr. S. has since, on the urgent request of her medical attendant, returned it to her, after breaking it in two. It is a common opinion that Mr. S. will not be indicted, and the provocation is considered in the estimation of many at Washington a justification of the awful deed.
