

sion of English politics an exaggerated tone which is to be regretted.

"Such polemics have not only the inconvenience of disquieting [commercial] interests and exciting [public] opinion, but further contribute to aggravate that distrust and hostility of which certain public organs in England are the impassioned partisans.

"When these attacks appear in journals which habitually defend the Imperial policy they then assume a still graver character, because, in the eyes of foreigners, the Government is held responsible.

"It is therefore essential that all papers upon which the influence of the Administration can be brought to bear should be invited to observe greater circumspection.

"Without doubt, it is useless to refute errors and protest against calumnies and injustice; but, whilst energetically defending the rights and intentions of France, which is the duty of the press, it is easy to respect the susceptibilities of a great nation, and protect the friendly relations of the two countries. It is in unison with these views which reconcile the dignity of the Imperial policy with the interests of our alliances and the maintenance of peace that the prefects should influence the press and public opinion.

"For the moment, Messieurs the Prefects will limit themselves to the confidentially presenting recommendations to those newspapers on whose loyalty and discretion they can rely, and should abstain from interfering with opposition journals, save when by the exaggeration of their tone they place themselves in open opposition to the views of the Government, in which case they should be immediately reported to the Minister of the Interior."

Diplomatic relations between France and Austria are now fully restored, the appointment of ambassador from Paris to Vienna, and vice versa, being announced in the French and Austrian official journals.

ITALY.

The Patrie says:—"The news received from Italy is most satisfactory. The acceptance by the French Government of the appointment of M. Buoncompagni has produced the best effects on the people. All persons are unanimous in declaring this combination as a pledge given to the cause of order. It is hoped that M. Buoncompagni may exercise his power with all the authority necessary for the maintenance of the status quo, until the time of the meeting of the Congress."

A letter from Parma in the Milan Gazette states that most probably the Assemblies of Central Italy will be convoked. It adds that the people are loud in demanding the return of General Garibaldi. A letter from Turin of the 22nd, in the Patrie, says:—"King Victor Emmanuel has sent to Garibaldi as a present a handsome fowling-piece, which he himself used. The King is a keen sportsman, and he was accustomed at one time to extend his sporting excursions to the small islets which surround the island of Sardinia. Garibaldi is the proprietor of one of them, which he occupied himself with clearing when he returned to Europe after having amassed some money in the guano trade between Peru and China."

General Garibaldi left Nice on the 21st inst. for Genoa. Before his departure he addressed the inhabitants of Nice, and said,—"I shall be ready to resume my command when necessary. Let us be united under Victor Emmanuel; let us continue under arms as long as an inch of Italian soil remains oppressed." A letter from Nice of the 19th says:—"General Garibaldi has arrived here, to the great astonishment of everybody. Not a soul knew anything of his coming, with the exception of Colonel Deideri, his host, who received a telegraphic despatch the evening before to apprise him of it. The proclamation addressed by the general to the Italians will excite great interest, as it throws light on what is passing in Central Italy, and seems to explain the real state of affairs. Garibaldi left Bologna some days ago, passed through Turin, only staying just long enough to see the King, and got here at the same time as the Turin journals which announced his arrival in the capital. I have seen the general; he is in excellent health, notwithstanding all the fatigue which he has undergone. His position here imposes on him the strictest reserve. He is not generally very communicative and now he is less so than usual, but his every word betrays a profound irritation."

The Corriere Mercantile publishes a following proclamation, issued by General Garibaldi on his arrival at Genoa, addressed "To my Companions in Arms of Central Italy in which he says—

"For you, as for me, the greatest of all possible misfortunes would be not to be present wherever there is fighting for Italy. Young men who have sworn to be faithful to Italy and to the chief who will lead you to victory, lay not down your arms; remain firm at your post, continue your exercises, persevere in the soldier's discipline.

"The truce will not last long; old diplomacy seems but little disposed to see things as they really are. Diplomacy still looks upon you as the handful of malcontents which she has been accustomed to despise. She does not know that in you there are the elements of a great nation, and that in your free and independent hearts there germinate the seeds of a world-wide revolution if our rights shall not be recognised, and if people will not allow us to be masters in our own home.

"We desire to invade no foreign soil; let us remain unmolested on our own! Whoever attempts to gain this our determination will find that we will never be slaves, unless they succeed in crushing by force an entire people ready to die for liberty.
