danger, till she struck, about 5 o'clock, A. M., on Monday the 21st.

We have only space to give a very brief account of the sad disaster.

The vessel went on, not with a shock but a rip, from the very sound of which it was perfectly evident that the bottom of the forward part at least, was literally torn out. Before the firemen could leave the stoke hole, the water was nearly up to the roof of the furnace doors. and in about twenty minutes the engine room filled, almost up to the highest platform. About 45 minutes after, she struck with a tremendous crash, the vessel began to part amidships most of the hands left the boats at which they were working, and crowded to those which were out.

There appears to have been great confusion in lowering the boats, which was the cause in great measure of the loss of life-several being thrown out of the boats by carelessness. It is supposed that 19 persons were drowned.

About daylight the vessel parted completely in two, the forward part falling over almost on its beam, and the after part settling down in about twenty one feet of water.
