

JOHN MITCHELL AGAIN.—John Mitchell, who is now in Paris, has commenced a series of letters in a Dublin paper called *The Irishman* in which his object is to suggest to the Irish peasantry that France will soon be at war with England in the Mediterranean, and that the opportunity will then have arrived for inducing the Emperor Napoleon to invade Ireland. "But" exclaims Mr. Mitchell, "who will make the Emperor sure that the Irish people wait for him and pray for him? How is he to know that 252,000 fighting men would be found to follow his eagles from Bantry Bay to Dublin, and from thence if he chose it across to Liverpool? How, above all, are the people—the people of all classes and creeds—to be brought to look steadily towards this as an eve it not only possible but probable, and which may to each of them bring joy or sorrow just as they may demean themselves in it?"

We have much pleasure in stating that the noble-hearted Lady Franklin has presented the steamer Fox to Captain M'Clintock, her late gallant and successful commander, as a reward for his meritorious services.—*United Service Gazette.*

As the Conference of Zurich opened on the 8th of August, and closed on the 17th inst., it had lasted ten weeks. The expenditure of the plenipotentiaries and their suites at the Hotel Bauer is said to amount to about 100,000fr.—a fine windfall for a Swiss hotel!

The Mayor of Sunderland, Mr John Candlish, who is a Baptist, instead of the usual balls and dinners, has given 200*l.* towards the establishment of a female reformatory.

The *Journal de Constantinople* gives an account of a curious religious ceremony which has just taken place in that city. It is the reception by the Sultan, of the golden gutter in which is collected the rain that falls upon the temple at Mecca, and which thenceforward is considered by the Mussulmans as holy water. The gutter has been carried from Mecca, and received by the Sultan with pompous ceremonies.

A bell of green glass, fourteen inches high and thirteen inches in diameter, has been placed in the turret of the chapel at Borrowdale England.

NOTICE!

The following Act is republished for general information by the direction of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor—and the attention of all public functionaries and others, is particularly called to its provisions, to take effect upon the 1st January next.

CHAPTER 24.

An Act to establish the Decimal System of Accounting.

(Passed the 15th day of April, A. D., 1859.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. This Act shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1860.

2. All accounts to be rendered to the Provincial Government or to any public officer or department by any officer or functionary, or by any party receiving aid from this province or otherwise accountable to the government or legislature thereof, shall be so rendered in Dollars and Cents; but any such account may have a second column containing sums in pounds, shillings and pence, equivalent to the sums so stated in dollars and cents, if the accountant shall prefer to render his account in that form.

3. The several coins hereinafter mentioned, shall be received and paid at the provincial treasury and other departments as equivalent for the following sums in money of account, namely:

The gold sovereign of the United Kingdom, at five dollars.

Silver crown of the United Kingdom, at one dollar and twenty-five cents.

Silver half crown of the United Kingdom, at sixty-two and a half cents.

Silver florin of the United Kingdom, at fifty cents.

Silver shilling of the United Kingdom, at twenty-five cents.

Silver sixpence of the United Kingdom, at twelve and a half cents.

Copper penny of the United Kingdom, and that issued from the treasury of the province—two cents.

Half penny—one cent.

3. Nothing herein contained shall affect the coins enumerated in Chapter 83 of the Revised Statutes, but such coins shall continue to be received as legal tender at the rate in such chapter specified.
