Another severe Battle Fought.

Merchants' Exchange, Halifax June 20th, 1859. The Steamship Anglo Saxon has arrived at Quebec, dates from Liverpool to the 8th inst. Another severe battle has taken place between the Austrians and French, near Milan, (date not given in despatch.) in which the Austrians were defeated, and were forced to evacuate that place. The Austrians are stated to have lost 20,000 in killed and wounded, the French 12,000. Cotton quiet with a decline of 1/4 upon previous quotations. Breadstuffs, prices downward, all descriptions have slightly declined. Provisions dull. Tea and coffee market firm. Consols at close, 93 1/4 to 93 1/2.

DEAR BROTHER,

Permit me to acknowledge the receipt of five beautiful specimens of polished petrefactions procured in Antigua, and presented to the College Museum by Captain Joseph Rogers, of Hebron, Yarmouth County. All the friends may not be aware of the existence of our Museum. It is situated in the attic story of the west end of the College building. It is about twenty feet by thirty, well finished, and furnished with glass cases containing angulated inclined planes for holding the rare specimens collected at home and abroad by Professor Chipman and others. Any curiosities of nature or of art would doubtless be thankfully received by the Museum.

I am also happy to announce, that the members of Acadia Lyceum (a literary society among the Students) have presented the endowment fund with a scholarship of £100. The effort is highly creditable, made as it was, by a number of young men, some of whom, perhaps unaided, are yet struggling with all the difficulties of College life. We cannot doubt, however, that if all our people could mingle for a short time in the scenes in which these young men have moved, and could see and feel as they do the necessity of Acadia College, many such scholarships would be voluntarily raised, and our Endowment fund soon completed. I will embrace this opportunity of urging the immediate payment of all interest, and pledges for the current expenses of the College. Remember our teachers have faithfully performed the duties of the year and are now looking for their pay.

It is also very important that the people should be urged to sustain the missionary liberally, according to their ability. Brethren appointed to missions should, if possible, fulfil them; or if not able should give timely notice to the Secretary, that the Board may seek others to occupy the ground.

Notice to the Public. PARCEL POST.

THE Legislature the last Session having authorized the introduction of the Parcel Post, similar to that in Canada, the following Notice is now issued for the information of the Public:

From the 1st of July, 1859, parcels closed at the ends and sides may be posted at any Post Office in Nova Scotia, for conveyance to any other Post Office (not Way Office) in the Province, at a rate of Postage subject to the following conditions:

- 1. No Letter or Letters shall be enclosed. 2. The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquids, or other matter likely to injure the ordinary contents of the Mail, under penalty of the forfeiture of the parcel. 3. The weight of the parcel shall not exceed 3 lbs., nor the size exceed one foot in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness. 4. Parcels must be prepaid at the following rates, and by postage stamps, not by money: If weighing less than 1 lb., 1s. 3d. More than 1 lb., and not exceeding 2 lbs., 2s. 6d. More than 2 lbs., and not exceeding 3 lbs., 3s. 9d. 5. The parcel may be Registered on pre-payment, also by Stamp, of a Registration Fee of 6d. in addition to the above rate. 6. The parcel shall have the words, "By Parcel Post" plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the name of the County in which the Post Office is situated. The following is an example of the mode of address recommended: By Parcel Post. To Mr. JAMES SMITH, Antigonish Post Office, County of Sydney, Nova Scotia. Sent by William Jones, Wilmot, Annapolis County. 7. If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the sender on payment of an additional rate of 1s. 3d. for the return conveyance. 8. If the number of stamps affixed on a packet be insufficient to pre pay the proper rate, the amount deficient will be rated unpaid, with a fine of 6d. in addition.
