HOUSE OF LORDS.

On Tuesday at two o'clock, afternoon 31st ult. the sixth Parliament of her present Majesty was formally inaugurated by commission.

The Lord Chancellor said—My lords and gentlemen, I have the commands of her Majesty to let you know that, as soon as the members of both houses are sworn, the cause of her Majesty's calling the present Parliament will be declared to you.

The returns to the writ to elect sixteen Scotch representative peers was then presented and read.

The rest of their lordships present also took the oaths, and the swearing in continued during the afternoon.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The members of the new house assembled at two o'clock.

The old members chiefly occupied their own seats; the new members either stood in groups on the floor or seated themselves near their friends.

After a short time spent in shaking hands, mutual introductions, and congratulations, the Usher of the Black Rod appeared at the bar, and, approaching the table, summoned the house to attend in the House of Lords and hear the royal commission read.

On their return Sir Denis LeMarchant took his seat at the table, the Speaker's chair remaining vacant.

The Right Hon. John Evelyn Denison, the Speaker of the former House, was elected to that office; after which the CHANCELLOR of the EXCHEQUER rose and moved that "this house do now adjourn," which was put and the house immediately rose.

MR. ROEBUCK ON POLITICS AND THE WAR

At a dinner given on the occasion of the inauguration of a new line of steamships from Milford Haven, on Saturday.

Mr. Roebuck, in speaking to the toast "The House of Commons," said: We have to choose upon the 7th of June whether we shall have Lord Palmerston or Lord Derby for Prime Minister.

My object is to vindicate what I believe will be the course of the House of Commons. I cannot believe that that house will so far forget its duty and forfeit the power over the people of England as to return into the council for the Government of this country one so utterly inefficient as Lord Palmerston.

Let others tear themselves to pieces; let France and Austria fight as long as they please; England should look on quietly if they wish to destroy themselves, and should only be opposed to any Power which may be thoroughly victorious.

TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION BETWEEN ENGLAND AND AMERICA.

DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH NAPLES.

I believe the truth to be this, that the English Government did instruct Sir James Hudson to go to Naples on a mission to the new king independently of France, but that in consequence of representations from the French Government, Sir James received counter orders.

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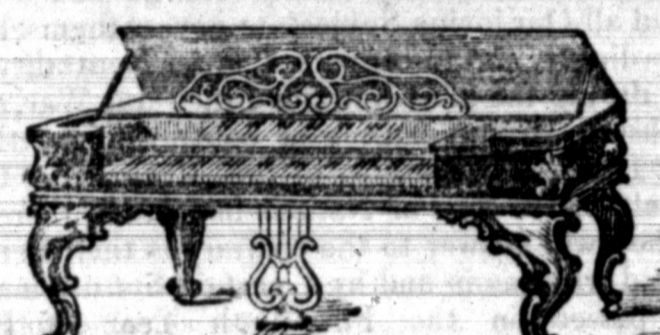
