

PRESENTATION TO THE COUNTESS OF SHAFTESBURY.—On Saturday the 6th ult., a marble bust of the Earl of Shaftesbury was presented, in the Free-trade Hall, Manchester, to "Emily, wife of the seventh Earl of Shaftesbury, by the operatives of the North of England, as a token of esteem and regard for the persevering and successful efforts of her noble husband, in promoting, by legislative enactment, a limitation of the hours of labour of children and females, and young persons employed in mills and factories." The Earl and Countess, with the Hon. Mr. Ashley, were present, and the hall was completely filled with an attentive and interested audience.

After the reading of the address by Mr. W. Stanley, and the presentation of the bust by two female factory operatives, the countess briefly but feelingly replied. She said:—"My good friends, it will not require many words from me to express the deep and heartfelt gratitude with which I receive the testimonial of your respect and affection. I prize it highly, as coming from a large body of my countrymen whose character for intelligence and morality qualifies them to estimate at their true value any efforts made for the welfare of the community. You will believe, I am sure, that, having watched the progress of your exertions with lively interest, I warmly rejoiced in your success, and it is my fervent prayer to God that it may be blessed through many generations to you and to your children."

The Earl of Shaftesbury, who was most warmly greeted on rising, added his thanks to those of the Countess, to whom he said their testimonials were indeed more due than to him self; for he must tell them that in the year 1833, when the matter was propounded to him, he had great doubts, not of the justice of the cause, but of his own competency to undertake it. He sought counsel on the right hand and on the left, but he left the issue to the decision of his wife, and she, without a moment's hesitation said, "Go forward, and to victory!" Drawing a moral from this anecdote, let the men of Lancashire and Yorkshire learn a little more to submit to the counsel of their wives, for, if he knew anything of the character of Lancashire and Yorkshire women, they would give good advice to their husbands and keep their houses in order. They could not reflect without the deepest gratitude on the contrast between the present state of things and what it was before this movement was instituted. Many of those present could recollect very well the long and tedious hours inflicted upon children of tender years, the utter impossibility that any of those wretched children could receive the slightest education or moral training at home or in school; that they were fading away, drooping into an early grave, and looking when they issued from the mills more like-walking spectres than, as they ought to be, rosy and joyful, full of the prospect of future life.

INCIDENTS OF THE VILAFRANCA PEACE.—I think you will one day learn that, as ruler of the Lombard State, Victor Emmanuel has 250 millions of francs (ten millions sterling) to pay to Austria as a species of indemnity forming part of the portion of debt to be supported by Lombardy. I cannot doubt these words having been spoken by Louis Napoleon:—"Make them pay, sire; they have plenty wherewith to do it." It ever history really speaks out, you will learn that the instructions given to the confidential aide-de-camp who "fetched up" Victor Emmanuel to the signature of the Villafranca peace were these:—"Twenty minutes to go in, twenty to return, twenty for reflection; I can make the agreement without the King's presence." You will find, too, when all is cleared up, that Austria, in a great measure, settled her own terms, having twice refused those proposed. The first words spoken by Louis Napoleon to Francis Joseph were these:—"Sire, you and I command the two finest armies in the whole world; let us embrace each other."—*Paris Correspondent of the Manchester Guardian.*

M. LAMARTINE.—The Municipality of Paris has granted to M. de Lamartine and his family the enjoyment for life of a house and a piece of ground in the Bois de Boulogne. The gift required the sanction of the Council of State. It will hardly be believed that this testimony of gratitude and admiration—of gratitude to the man who, whatever may have been his errors, at one time certainly saved Paris and all France from the horrors of anarchy, and of admiration for the poet who has shed lustre on his country—that this testimony has encountered opposition in that body.

THE STATE OF THE THAMES.—Much illness, and indeed death, has occurred in the neighbourhood of Westminster and Bermondsey the last few days, owing, most unquestionably, to the putrid and disgraceful state of the river, aided as it is by the intolerable heat; whilst in the low neighbourhood of Bermondsey, amongst the wharfingers and journeyman tanners, sudden seizures whilst at work are of daily occurrence.—*Lancet.*

ENGLAND AND FRANCE.—A clergyman of the Church of England, the donor of the Great Exhibition Prize Essay, has offered two prizes of fifty guineas each—one for England and one for France, for the best essay on the immense importance of a close union of England and France, both for their own interest and welfare, and for the peace and happiness of the world, with suggestions on the best means of making this union perpetual. The Right Honourable Lord Brougham and Vaux, and the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, have kindly consented to be the adjudicators of the English essay.

Spain authorised the laying of a Transatlantic telegraph wire, via the Canaries and Cuba, to Brazil. The work was to begin at once under French supervision.
