ELECTRO-BIOLOGY.—Dr. Stone is again on a visit to Halifax. He is delivering a course of lectures on Electro Biology every evening this week. The extraordinary developments of this science astonish the most enlightened audiences. The wonderful power he exerts over those he puts under the influence of what he calls magnetism, may well excite the curiosity and enquiry of thinking men. It is doubtless the manifestation of a principle in human nature not yet fully understood, and probably will at some future time be applied to some important purposes in the economy of life.

COAL.—A letter in the Colonist from Mr. Angus McDougall, C. E., gives a description of a coal mine at Cow Bay, Cape Breton. He says:—"With the expenditure of about one thousand pounds in the construction of a wharf and the purchase of machinery, this mine could be put in a position where seven or eight thousand tons of coal might annually be disposed of that would realize from one to one and three quarter dollars profit per ton. Should circumstances induce a greater amount of capital to enter more extensively into it, or so far as to require steam appliances for raising and draining, there is a sufficient amount that may be worked, for the vein would yield about eleven thousand tons per acre.

This vein or seam is superior to any yet discovered in this island for its thickness and good quality, as well as for its convenience to navigation, that for transportation may be relied upon at least six months in the year."

"THE THEATRE OF WAR."—They are doing such a tremendous stroke of business at this theatre, that for the present all complimentary admissions are refused, and even the public press is suspended.—Punch.

New Brunswick.—The Central Bank of New Brunswick has resumed specie payment.

Canada.—The Barley crop in the County of Kent, Canada, is proving a failure. The worm has destroyed whole fields, and farmers are reploughing and substituting millet in its place.

The CITY GOVERNMENT of Montreal has been in a state of confusion and inefficiency but little creditable to that city. The Council it appears have been overawed and insulted by a mob whilst the Mayor has either not the disposition or else not the courage, to enforce the law, and preserve order. Dissatisfaction with the taxation of the city, it seems, has been the cause of this disturbance. Some of the Council have refused to remain longer under the presidency of Mr. Rodier.
