Send on the names if possible before the the Spanish Government. No doubt much of the traditional feeling which once expelled the Moors from Spain animates the minds of Spaniards still. But the same feeling is equally strong on the other side. The Emperor of Morocco can summon to his aid vast numbers of the same class of soldiers who, under the lead of Abd-el-Kader, gave the French no little trouble in Algeria. One hundred thousand believers in the Prophet are said to be ready to try their desert-andmountain style of warfare with the regular soldiery of her Apostolic Majesty; and to try whether taith in the imposter of Rome, or the imposter of Mecca, can serve them best in the day of battle.

But what are they to "kill each other for"? This we ought to be able " to make out." The Flounced Robes, Rich Damasures, Highland Plaids, manifesto of the Moor and that of the Spaniard in silk and wool fabrics, Crossover Robes, and other have been published almost together. The fashionable Dresses, are to be cleared during the documents, indeed, appeared in the very same week without any regard to cost! column of the leading daily paper; and they have necessarily been subjected to the scrutinising criticism of English editors. The journal of widest circulation pronounces judgment, on the whole, against the Moors. The journal which on foreign affairs is generally much better informed, certainly more impartial, The Daily News, decides against the Spaniards; and, after the hest examination we can make of the documents we are disposed to lean to the latter judgment.

The general charge against the semi-civilised natives of Morocco is true enough The Riff pirates we have all heard of; and it is probable that, however desirous, for the sake of peace with the mighty Powers of Europe, the Emperor might be, he was really unable to restrain their depredations. All the other Powers were, however, interested equally with Spain in compelling these pirates to forego their practices; yet none of them have, hitherto, made them a ground of war with the Emperor of Morocco. It is open, by the law of nations, to the men-of-war of any country to pursue pirates anywhere, and to deal with them without mercy. We fear, therefore, that the war was, on the part of Spain a premeditated thing. France had been acquiring such a stock of military glory of late, that her neighbour began to wish for a share in the same kind of honour .- Freeman

MISCELL'ANEOUS.

THE ARM OF LAZARUS. - According to the tradition of the Roman Catholic Church, Lazarus, who was raised from the dead, was one of the most zealous followers of our Saviour, and became the first Bishop of Marseilles-and his head has always been preserved in the cathedral of that city, whilst his body is in the cathedral of Autun. Some time back the bishop of the latter diocese resolved on presenting one of the arms of the saint to Marseilles, and the Bishop of Marseilles caused a shrine to be prepared at his own expense to hold both the head and arm. The arm having been removed to Marseilles and placed in the shrine, the latter was three days ago promenaded about the city with great pomp, and afterwards solemnly deposited in a place prepared for it in the cathedral. All the clergy of Marseilles, all the religious orders, male and female, and the different communities of penitents, black, blue, white, and grey, together with a great number of the fai:hful, figured in the procession and at the religious services in the cathedral; as did also the Bishops of Marseilles, Autun, Satala, and Ceramus. In the procession were bands of music, and flags, and banners, and the shrine was carried aloft by eight deacons, attired in robes of red velvet. The whole passed off without accident, and excited great curiosity.

THE BONES FROM THE CRIMEA.—A letter in The Times, from Messrs. Keighley, of Hull disposes finally and satisfactorily of the unpleasant surmises raised concerning the bones recently imported from the Crimea. It appears that not only have the authorities at Hull ascertained that the cargoes consisted entirely of the bones of horses and other large animals, but that a " religious prejudice" exists among the Russians against the exportation of human bones, to prevent the possibility of which offence inspectors are appointed to superintend the loading of ships in the Crimean ports.
