FIRE IN GRANVILLE STREET IN 1792.—The following interesting reminiscence we copy from the Sun:

We have been kindly loaned, by a chronological friend, a volume of the Edinburgh Magazine, published in 1792, in which we find, among a variety of interesting items, the paragraph quoted below. It is a curious fact that the scene of the disaster of 1792, had some points of similarity with that of our recent conflagration, and that it was only by great exertion that the Ordnance laboratory, and the property of the late Mr. Welner, escaped destruction.

Attempts are still being made to launch the Peerless from the Marine Railway at Dartmouth, but without success. H. M. Steamer Gladiator was at work on Monday, but breaking two large hawsers, it also failed in getting her off.

HALIFAX FIRE DEPARTMENT.—The fire bells rang on Monday afternoon, and aroused the city to activity and anxiety. On arriving near the Province Building the whole brigade went to work and poured water over Hare's buildings from top to bottom, some of the engines sending the water perhaps twenty feet above them.

The body of a man was picked up at Steve's wharf, on Thursday. It was ascertained to be that of Mr. John McCann, who had been missing for some time, and who, it was supposed, had gone to Newfoundland.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—Robert Faulkner and his son about 16 years of age, were drowned on Sabbath last the 6th inst., by the upsetting of a boat. They belonged to Burncoat, the other side of the Bay. They brought over potatoes to Economy on Saturday, and were about to return to their home when the sad accident took place.

LOST OVERBOARD ON OCTOBER 16th, in a gale of wind, George Smith, a young seaman 18 years of age. This sad accident happened on the same night after leaving Matland, about 80 miles from his home. It is a heavy trial to his widowed mother. But she has a hope that he was a believer in Christ.—Ib.

SINKING OF THE STEAMBOAT NEW WORLD.—On the evening of the 26th ult. the splendid steamboat New World, on her trip to Albany was sunk near Spuyten Duyvel Creek, a few miles from New York. From some cause hitherto not satisfactorily given, her walking-beam broke, or was thrown from its bearings, breaking off the massive piston-rod—nine inches in diameter, which dropped through deck and saloon, and pierced the bottom of the boat.
