held by the Emperor on the Champ de Mars on Sunday. 15,000 infantry and 6,000 cavalry and artillery were on the ground. After the troops had defiled past, the Emperor repaired sentinels to allow the Crowd to approach. His Majesty was immediately surrounded by an immense concourse of people, who rushed with precipitation almost under the feet of the horses, shouting with great enthusiasm " Vive l'Empereur!" No accident whatever arose from this demonstration, which was quite spontaneous on the part of the public.

The French papers appear much impressed with the proceedings taken in England in respect of its navy; at the magnitude of our resources, and as the extent of the operations which these resources permit us to undertake. A Parisjan journal declares that all the dockyards of all the maritime powers in the world could not, even by combining their efforts, accomplish in a single year what we propose to effect before this time twelvemouth-viz, the construction of twenty-six powerful men-of-war, including fifteen line of battle ships,

The Neapolitan police have been warned that cases of explosive materials and fulminating powder, conceated under layers of tobacco, have been sent from Genoa, and are en route to Naples. A circular has been sent from the heads of the Custom House to their agents, enjoining the most strict attention and examination of everything arriving from Genoa. The letter is in manuscript, and strictly confidential.

They were visited at the Bath Hotel on Monday by Mr. Gladstone and several other distinguished persons; and a committee for their aid has also been formed, with Lord Shaftesbury at its head, and with Lord Palmerston, Lord John Russell, Mr. Gladstone, Mr. Milner Gibson, and others, as members. WAS PETER BISHOP OF ROME? letter from Lord Shaftesbury appeared in The Times last week :- " Sir, - It is with great deference that I venture to address the public through your columns on the subject of the landing of Count Poerio and his friends on the shores of England. First, some national expression is due to these honest and heroic men, who have, with such magnanimity and patience, endured many years of suffering in e just and noble cause But, secondly, we may now clearly and decidedly prove to the world that, though the people of these realms denounce a war in Europe for Italian independance, and cherish no sympathy with wild and lawless revolutionists, they have a deep and lively interest in the welfare of that country, and heartily wish 'God speed' to those who, by wise and legitimate means, seek to attain the unspeakable blessings of civil and religious liberty,-I am, Sir, your obedient servant, SHAFTESBURY."

It is understood that their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess Frederick William of has assumed all the liabilities of the late firm, Prussia, accompained by their infant son, will arrive in this country early in May, on a visit to her Majesty and the Prince Consort.

The Emperor Soulouque is positively going to Paris, not, perhaps, to reside there permanently, but to stay some time. His nide-de camp, General Dessalines, has taken apartments for his sable Majesty at the Hotel du Louvre.

AFRICA .- The Daily News reports the death of Gezo, the slave-king of Dahomey. Eight hundreds slaves were massacred at a sacrifice on the occasion.

The Prince Imperial, son of the Emperor Napoleon, has entered his fourth year.

LORD CLYDE.—The Friend of India of the 10th ult. says :- " Several of our contemporaries are amusing their readers with speculations as to the date of the Commander-in-Chief's departure, and the name of his successor. All such speculations are, to say the least, premature. The Commander-in-Chief has no intention of quitting India this year, and will probably remain long enough to carry out the plan of reorganisation."

The Earl of Devon died on Saturday, at the advanced age of eighty-two. It may be remembored that a suit is pending in the Divorce Court, in which the Earl prayed for a divorce from his Countess on the ground of cruelty.

Earl Ferrers died on Sunday week, of congestion of the lungs, at the age of thirty eight His successor is a boy of twelve.

The foundation stone of a statue to the memory of the late Duniel O'Connell was laid at Ennis, on the 17th, in the presence of a great concourse of persons.

There had been a great number of accidents at Sepastopol from the bursting of shells; some twenty men and women have been killed the past year.
