We were startled and gratified on Friday last by a telegram from New York, on the arrival of the Steamer, bringing the important intelligence that an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities between the contending powers in Italy, had been agreed on, until the 15th of August, and that consequently great hopes of a more permanent peace were entertained. This news has been quite unexpected in all quarters, and under the circumstances can only have been brought about by the direct intervention of all the Great European Powers not immediately involved in the contest.

Such an event would seem to carry with it the assurance that the Austrians were either wholly, or to a great extent to retire from Italy, and so far verify the favorite Italian idea of "Italy for the Italians". Should such turn out to be the case, it is most probable that the Kingdom of Sardinia will be enlarged by the addition of Lombardy, where all the late battles have been fought, Tuscany, and the lesser independant Duchies, hitherto governed by reigning Dukes of the House of Austria; and perhaps also of the territory connected with Venice. This for the present would doubtless satisfy the Italians and might possibly lead to their final and permanent consolidation under a progressive constitutional government, such as Piedmont has lately presented.

We can hardly imagine, nevertheless, how Louis Napoleon is to be remunerated for the immense sacrifices of blood and treasure made by France. True, they have reaped a rich harvest of glory, which would seem in his own view to be the summum bonum or chief end of a Frenchman's existence, but successful conquerors have never as yet been quite satisfied with so unsubstantial a reward, and we can hardly believe that the Emperor of the French will form an exception.
