MARINE DISASTER .- The Brig Rover, Capt. Morrison, arrived here on Saturday evening last from Cienfuegos, with Capt. Abel and five of the crew of the brig Ann McKean of this port, belonging to W. B. Hamilton & Co., which vessel was destroyed at sea by fire on the 11th ult. The Ann McKean was bound from St. Jago to this port with a cargo of 250 puncheons of rum, and while off Cape Antonio on the 11th ult., a fire was discovered on board, and spread so rapidly that the Captain and crew had only time to put her before the wind and get the boat out in which they escaped, with only one oar. They were picked up by a Spanish vessel from which they were afterwards taken by an American ship bound to New York. After they had been taken by the American vessel, the Rover hove in sight, and finding that the crew of a Halifax vessel was on board the ship, they took off six,all she could accommodate,—the remaining two proceeded in the ship to New York. About half of the cargo of the Ann McKean was for Halifax, the remainder for St. John's Nfld. The Ann McKean was said to be one of the handsomest vessels out of this port .- Express.
