cies, etc., etc., etc. WHEREAS, upon reference to the trade re-turns annually made and laid before Parliament, there are reasons to believe that the payment of duties is in many cases evaded, and that the public revenues are in consequence largely diminished-

I do therefore, by and with the advice of the Executive ouncil, hereby command and enjoin upon all Collectors of Impost and Excise, all Seizing Officers, Tidewaiters, Magistrates, Sheriffs and others authorized to collect and protect the Public Révenue of the Province, to be vigilant and efficient in the discharge of their duties, and all other Her Majesty's liege subjects to be aiding and assisting in the prevention of smuggling and the carrying on of contraband trade, it being the fixed determination of Her Majesty's Government to protect fair dealing in all lawful ways, and to punish parties engaged in illicit traffic by the confiscation of smuggled and co traband goods, and the infliction of fi es and penalties as the law directs.
