Quite a panic is being experienced in New York, nearly equal to that of 1857. Several banks in the South have suspended specie payment.

The Cabinet at Washington is said to be disagreeing on the Secession question. The President professes to oppose it.

By late despatches we learn that Victor Emanuel has formally accepted the sovereignty of Naples, and Garibaldi had retired to his home.

ARRIVAL OF THE ARABIA

The Royal Mail Steamer Arabia arrived yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock, with news to the 18th inst.

We learn, from our Own Correspondent, whose highly interesting letter must be reserved for next week, that the Prince of Wales arrived at Plymouth Sound on Thursday morning, the 15th inst., after a tedious passage of 27 days. The stock of fresh provisions on board the Hero had been exhausted several days, and not more than a week's stores of salted and preserved provisions remained on hand.

Victor Emmanuel is declared "King of Italy" by a majority of 900,000 votes.

Garibaldi's retirement is but temporary. Probably for only a few months.

Some alarm is occasioned in the money market—the Bank of England has raised the rate of discount to six per cent, and it is likely to be still higher.

An attempt has been made by a Neapolitan officer on the life of Garibaldi. The shot was prevented taking effect by an officer present observing him. The hero merely ordered that his sword be taken from him—and he be removed from his presence.

REVIEW.—After several postponements in consequence of bad weather the review of troops—Volunteers and Regulars, came off on Wednesday last. About 4 or 500 of the former and 15 or 1600 of the latter appeared on the Common and went through various difficult movements together, the firing of the Volunteers was pronounced scarcely inferior to that of the Regular troops.

We are informed that Messrs Pryor and Sons' Warehouse was entered on Thursday night last, and robbed of four half-chests of Tea and one box of Tobacco. The thief we believe, has not yet been apprehended.—Reporter.

THE SABBATH QUESTION.—Judge Marshall gave a lecture on Thursday last at Temperance Hall on this question—defending the observance of the Lord's day as a day of rest, against the attacks of Mr. James Lithgow in the same place on the previous Friday. After the Judge had concluded, Mr. Lithgow rose to defend the positions he had taken, and was proceeding to comment on passages of Scripture which he conceived sustained his views, when Mr. McEwan arose to prevent his continuance, and an uproar immediately ensued, and the meeting was dismissed.

The Rev. John Brewster is announced as the next Lecturer before the Halifax Young Men's Christian Association on Tuesday evening, the 4th of Dec.—Subject—The House of Brunswick and the House of Bourbon, or the Story of two young Princes and its moral.

POLITICS.—Mr. W. Gammell one of the candidates for the representation of Victoria has withdrawn from the contest; leaving Mr. Kidson as the only one out at present.

SMALL POX has been prevalent at Chezetook for some time past, but in consequence of the judicious remedies and precautionary measures taken by the Sessions, called together for that purpose, it is, we learn, greatly abated.

The steamer Emperor will make her last trips from Windsor to St. John on the 1st and 8th of December, but will continue running between St. John, Digby and Annapolis until the 1st of January.

THE CLIFTON HOTEL AT WINDSOR was formally opened by a public dinner on the 20th inst. Hon. Jos. Howe presided. Several other members of the government were present and made speeches on the occasion. The company consisted principally of gentlemen from Halifax. Among the toasts was that of the Times' Correspondent who spoke so contemptuously of Windsor as "a village of shanties."
