

The regulations for the transmission of Book Packets b tween Nova Scotia, Bermuda and Newfoundtand, will be precisely the same as those which are now in force for the exchange of Books between this Province and the United Kingdom and the rates of Postage will also be the same, as follows:

Above 4 ozs and not exceeding 8 ozs. - 15 1 lb . . Above 8 ozs. " Above 1 lb. Every additional half pound or fraction of half a-pound -

A Book Packet may contain any number of sepadollars for injuries received from the husband rate Books or other Publications, Prints, or Maps, and any quantity of Paper, Parchinent, or Vettum; and the Books or other Publications, Prints, Maps, &c., may be either printed lithographed written or plain, or any mixture of the four. Further, all legitimate binding mounting, or covering of a Book Publication &c., or of a portion the reof, shall be allowed, whether such binding, & c., be loose or attached, as also rollers in the case of Prints or Maps; markers (whether of Even now it is worth crossing the island from pa er er otherwise) in the case of Books; and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but no patterns or books of patterns (unless consisting merely of paper) will be allowed:

The following conditions must be observed:-1 The entire postage must be prepaid, by Postage

Stamps. 2. Every Book Packet must be sent without a cover or in a cover open or the ends, or sides, so as to admit

of the enclosures being removed for examination. 3. No Book Packet may contain any written Letter, closed or open, or any enclosure scaled or other wise closed against in pection; nor must there be any letter, or any communication of the nature of a letter, written in any such Packet, or in or upon its cover. 4 No Book Packet must exceed two feet British in
