

A STANGER INDEED.—Among the arrivals in our harbor, on Wednesday last, was the "Barquentine" Landen, from Chicago, State of Illinois, laden with corn. This, we believe, is the first vessel which has ever entered the port of Halifax direct from Chicago; but it is to be hoped that the Landen may be the pioneer of a brisk trade between the two cities. The circuitous voyage, through the Lakes, Canadian Canals, river and gulf of St. Lawrence, and a part of the Atlantic ocean, was made, we perceive, in 28 days.—Recorder.

The steamer Canada, Lang, which left Cunard's Wharf, for Liverpool, on Thursday night last, a little after 12 o'clock, grounded on the Point Pleasant shoal, at full tide. After lightening the vessel of a portion of her coal &c, she was got off about midday on Saturday and was towed up by the Damascus, which ship arrived just in time to give the assistance required. How so great a mistake was made is quite incomprehensible to us. The night was dark to be sure, but at the time she struck, Meagher's Beach Light was shining brightly, and we observed a light on the upper point of George's Island.

The Canada was found to be uninjured. After re-coaling she sailed for Liverpool late on Saturday night.—Jour.

In the absence of the Earl of Mulgrave from the Province, General Trollope is entrusted with the Administration of the Government.—The following notice appeared in a Gazette Extra of Saturday last:

THE PRINCE'S RETURN FROM NEW BRUNSWICK AND DEPARTURE TO PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

We were a little incorrect last week we find respecting the Prince's embarkation at Hantsport. The Address to His Royal Highness was read and replied to, and the party embarked at the appointed place.

On returning from St. John the Styx arrived again at Hantsport early on Wednesday morning. After breakfasting at Windsor His Royal Highness and suite started for Truro, where the train arrived at 11 A.M. A guard of honor consisting of four companies of Volunteers from Halifax and Dartmouth had preceded them and were prepared for the reception.

A large company of gentlemen including members of the Government and Legislature were at the landing. The magistracy of the county lined the road thence to the first arch.—Here His Royal Highness entered his carriage and was driven slowly through the street to the Court House. The Sons of Temperance and other Societies kept the way the whole distance.

The decorations of Truro are spoken of as most magnificent. Several triumphal arches were erected. Immense gatherings of people had come from various parts of the country all around. It is said that not fewer than 15,000 people were in Truro. A temporary fountain was constructed on the square. The children of the Model School sang the National Anthem as the procession passed along. The carriage left Truro at 1 o'clock, and proceeded to Pictou where they arrived at 5 1/2 o'clock. Here another series of processions, royal salutes, address of welcome, arches, illuminations, and fireworks greeted His Royal Highness, who almost immediately went on board the Hero, which was in the harbour waiting his arrival.

Passing over to P. E. Island, the Prince and attendants landed at Charlottetown on Thursday morning.

PRESENTS FROM THE PRINCE OF WALES. We understand that H. R. Highness the Prince of Wales presented Lady Mulgrave with a magnificent diamond bracelet. A beautiful lithographic portrait of the Prince of Wales, was presented, by order of His Royal Highness, to Captain Cleaveland.

On the morning of the Prince leaving St. John's Newfoundland His Royal Highness presented Lady Berman with a beautiful bracelet set with emeralds and diamonds. Also engraved portraits of his royal sisters and brothers.

The Prince also gave a donation of £50 to the Church of England Asylum in St. John's for widows and orphans, the like sum to the Benevolent Irish Society, and £100 for boat races by the fishermen of St. John's and Harbor Grace.

When the Prince of Wales visited the Penitentiary at St. John's, N. F., the prisoners presented a petition to him praying to be released, —the Royal clemency was extended to seven prisoners.

His Royal Highness presented £50 to the Mac Mac Institution, and £125 to the Deaf and Dumb Institution in Halifax.

The flowers were manufactured in Paris from a wax model expressly for this occasion, and they were not only very becoming but attracted the attention of strangers, who admired their beauty and recognized the appropriateness and delicacy of the compliment.—Journal.

THE GREAT EASTERN.—We learn from the Express of Monday evening that Capt. Gulliford left here yesterday in the steamer Damascus for New York, for the purpose of piloting the Great Eastern into this port. The monster ship is advertised to leave New York on Thursday next.

H. M. Steamer Styx arrived on Monday from Hantsport. On Tuesday morning she came into collision with the schooner Active, of P. E. Island, and cut her down to nearly water's edge. The crew were saved and vessel towed into Shelburne.

SMALL POX.—It is said that there are a few cases of this disease in this city and that two or three deaths have been caused by it. The City Council has voted £500 to prevent contagion.
