

doubtful in both policy and principle. Our prisons now are little more than Asylums for the Inebriate, "Drunk and disorderly" is the crime of the majority of cases brought before our Police Court and yet no attempt is made by our city government to diminish the number of those licensed and authorized to make drunkards. When rulers cease to exist for the punishment of evil doers and for the praise of them that do well they fail in the work which is committed to them, and where the people are resolved on doing their duty they will replace them by better men.

We find the following account of the New York Asylum in one of our N. Y. exchanges:— As an auxiliary agent in the work of reform temperance meetings were held in the room every evening, and on Sunday religious services. The room was frequently crowded, and many were induced to sign the pledge of total abstinence and start upon a new course in life. The applications for admission have indeed been quite beyond the accommodations of the "Home," and the capacity of the managers to supply. Since the commencement of the present year, 160 persons have been received and cared for by this institution, and of these but twenty have relapsed thus far in their former habits. Many, indeed, have been restored to business and bid fair to again become useful and honored members of society.

The means used by the society in their work are somewhat peculiar. When a drunkard is placed under their care, either at his own instance or at the wish of friends, the first thing that is done is to attend to the exterior man. Rags and drunkenness go naturally together, and cleanliness, and a decent suit of clothing are found to be a remarkable auxiliary in awaking any latent germ of self-respect and transforming the drunkard into a man. When he is "clothed and in his right mind," he is treated by competent medical authority for the disease of intemperance. Preparations are administered for the purpose of arousing a healthy appetite, and at the same time lessening the morbid craving for alcoholic stimulants. This course of treatment, with such modifications as each particular case may demand, is continued until the patient feels himself able to resist temptation, and to take his place again among sober men.

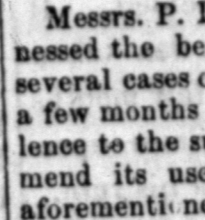

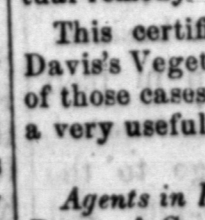
