Rags and drunkeneness go naturally together, and cleanliness, and a decent suit of clothing are found to be a remarkable auxiliary in awak ing any latent germ of self-respect and transforming the drunkard into a man. When he is "clothod and in his right mind," he is treated by competent medical authority for the disease of intemperance. Preparations are administered and at the same time lessening the morbid crav- tive of Horton, N. S. ing for alcoholic stimulants. This course of treatment. with such modifications as each particular case may demand, is continued until the patient feels himself able to resist temptation, and to take his place again among sober men.
