The French Government has directed an official inquiry to be made as to the average prices of the articles admitted into France by the new treaty with England, in order that ad valorem duties may be fixed upon them. It is not a very hopeful sign that the decree issued by the "free trade Emperor" directs the Council to consider the " degree of protection required for each branch of French industry," and by this scale to regulate the duties to be imposed on English manufactured goods. There is a rumour in Paris that M. Thouvenel and Count Pe.signy are about to change places, the Count assuming the duties of the Minister of the Interior and M. Thouvenel representing the French Government at the Court of St. James's.




