

and wished it discussed without delay as it was known by all parties that such bill was much needed. It was deferred till next day and the House resumed.

Mr. Killam obtained permission to return home on Saturday.

FRIDAY, May 4th.

Hon. Mr. Young moved the following:—Resolved, That His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor be respectfully requested to expend such sums as may be necessary for the suitable reception and accommodation of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and suite on his proposed visit to this province in the ensuing summer, and the House will provide therefor at their next session.

Passed unanimously. The Legislative Council sent down a Bill which they had passed relating to the appointment of Chief Justice in case of that office becoming vacant. This bill is similar to the one introduced by Dr. Tupper on Saturday April 28th. See report of that date. The Halifax Water Bill was deferred.

The bill relating to the importation of merchandise was taken up. One clause of the bill provided for allowing Rum to be imported in small quantities.

Mr. Longley spoke strongly against this part of the bill contending that the article which was so imported, was highly injurious and poisonous and ought not to be allowed to come into the country at all.

Hon. Mr. Johnston and Mr. Harrington also spoke against the regulation.

Hon. Mr. Wier and Mr. Morrison spoke in favor of the measure as one of revenue.

It was argued in favor of the bill that Rum would be smuggled into the province even if it were prohibited, and that it ought to be made to pay duty.

The bill was allowed to pass. Mr. Tobin moved that the bill be re-committed which motion was lost 26 to 15.

Mr. J. McDonald, chairman of the Committee to investigate the case of Mr. Archibald, reported that the sheriff was to blame for altering the oath administered at the hustings, and that Bribery had been practised at his election and that the facts and their opinions were against his election. They however left decision on the case for the house to determine upon.

SATURDAY, May 5th.

A Bill relating to liability of members of corporations was made the subject of some discussion. It was left in the bill at double the amount of the shares subscribed.

The Statute Labor Bill was taken up. Mr. Shaw objected to the clause which requires six days labour from young men living with their parents.

Mr. Tobin thought property should be taxed for repair of roads. On division the clause was retained by 16 to 14.

Hon. Mr. Young presented the report of the Committee on Agriculture. Adopted.

Mr. Longley reported from Committee on the Bill relating to licenses for sale of intoxicating liquors. It passed a second reading.

A Bill for the support of the City Hospital by a tonnage on certain shipping entering the harbour was considered and passed.

Mr. Blanchard reported from the Education committee a bill to continue the Education Act.

Mr. Churchill called attention to "inaccuracies" in the report of his speech referring to Volunteer Companies as published in the Morning Chronicle. He denied using several expressions there attributed to him.

MONDAY, May 6th.

Hon. Provincial Secretary laid on the table several despatches relating to intercolonial trade and railway expenses, and a stationary account.

Mr. McFarlane reported from the committee to try Mr. Blanchard's eligibility stating that he was eligible and duly elected.

Hon. President of Council called attention to the report of the Committee to try the election of A. G. Archibald. The report and evidence were read. Hon. Mr. Young addressed the House, and concluded by moving, preceded by a lengthy preamble, the following resolution:

"That in the opinion of this House, the personal imputation and charge of Bribery, in the petition of William Fleming and others, against the Hon. A. G. Archibald, is completely disproved by the evidence adduced before the Committee, and that he was duly elected, and is entitled to retain his seat in the House."

Several gentlemen on both sides briefly addressed the House.

Mr. James McDonald, the chairman of the Committee, moved that the evidence taken before the Committee be printed, for the information of members.

The discussion of this continued till about 4 past 7, when Hon. Mr. Young moved an adjournment of the House, which was carried by 25 to 21. This debate was resumed yesterday. The Legislature is expected to rise this week.

European & Foreign News.

FRANCE.

The legislative body of France have voted by 238 to 6 the contingent of 100,000 men for the present year; at the same time the minimum height for recruits in the French army has been reduced.

A Vienna letter says that the Austrian Cabinet is extremely wishful to make terms with the English Government; and the Viennese people talk free of an approaching visit of the Emperor of Austria to London.

The Paris papers contain the following account of the commencement of the voting upon the question of annexation to France, which took place at Nice on Sunday—"The voting by ballot has commenced. The electors in crowds are depositing their votes. Immense enthusiasm is manifested, and it appears certain that there will be a large majority for annexation to France. The country people are arriving, headed by their cures, and preceded by drums and colours. Voting tickets in favour of annexation to France, and bearing the inscription 'Yes' are attached to their hats. Perfect order prevails."

The French Government has directed an official inquiry to be made as to the average prices of the articles admitted into France by the new treaty with England, in order that ad valorem duties may be fixed upon them. It is not a very hopeful sign that the decree issued by the "free trade Emperor" directs the Council to consider the "degree of protection required for each branch of French industry," and by this scale to regulate the duties to be imposed on English manufactured goods. There is a rumour in Paris that M. Thouvenel and Count Pezigny are about to change places, the Count assuming the duties of the Minister of the Interior and M. Thouvenel representing the French Government at the Court of St. James's.

SPAIN.

The Spanish rebels are receiving quick and summary justice. Senor Carrion has been shot, another officer is hotly pursued through Catalonia. Ortega's trial goes on, and Carbera returns to London. It is asserted that the French Government have congratulated Queen Isabella on the happy termination of the rebellion.

The Spanish Pretender and his brother are not among the prisoners taken with General Ortega, but their being in Spain seems to be assumed from the systematic search for them which has been ordered by the Government. The son of General Ortega had presented a petition to the Queen requesting her Majesty to spare the life of his father.

ITALY.

The debates in the Sardinian Parliament have given a new feature to Continental politics, and the freedom of discussion allowed there will, it is to be hoped, lighten the mass of Governmental supervision which pervades the Continent. On Saturday, a question was asked in the Chambers respecting the late events in Sicily, but Count Cavour, with due caution, warned the Chambers against debating such a subject, on the ground that anything they could say would be dangerous and useless. With a similar circumspection, a petition from the northern part of Savoy was treated.

The Sardinian Chambers now stand prorogued to the 1st of May. The prorogation has taken place to afford the deputies an opportunity of joining the King on his tour through Central Italy, and the great mass of the members have expressed a wish to accompany the cortege of the King. Immense preparations are made throughout the province to receive his Majesty and his faithful deputies. Victor Emmanuel will, during his journey, assume the title of King of the Italian Kingdom.

Garibaldi, still grumbles at the annexation, and in a popular ovation which was given to him at Turin the other day, he said he interpreted the cry of an "Italian Nice," which was raised by the people, into a protest against the performance of a "disloyal and immoral act."

THE KINGDOM OF THE TWO SICILIES.

THE INSURRECTION AT NAPLES.

"The direct steamer from Naples arrived this evening, and brings advices from that city to the 14th inst.

"It is asserted that on Thursday last a large bomb was thrown before the Palace. The explosion shattered all the windows. No person was injured.

"The revolutionary attempt of the 8th at Messina commenced by the killing of two sentinels

"The movement was less serious than reported by the passengers of the Meander, which remained at a great distance from the spot where the combat took place.

"Flying columns were pursuing the bands of insurgents, who had taken refuge in the mountains.

"It is certain that no preparation had been made to pass the Roman frontier, unless an attack were made against Rome by Piedmont.

"Intelligence from Rome adds that the Pope had resolved to take no initiative in a war on the Romagna, and that General Lamoriciere would only concentrate a corps in Umbria between Rome and Ancona."

"10,000 men were pursuing the insurgent bands."

"Since the insurrection commenced the Government has sent into Sicily four battalions of infantry, two battalions of artillery, and a regiment of lancers. The Governor of Sicily had written that no more reinforcements need be sent, his forces being sufficient."

MISCELLANEOUS.

THE TEMPERANCE MOVEMENT IN RUSSIA.—The Jews of the city of Wilna have joined the teetotal movement which has lately sprung up in some of the more westerly provinces. To invest their resolution with a higher degree of solemnity, it was announced in the synagogue, a special service having been celebrated for this purpose. At its close the new converts, headed by their chief rabbi, through to the street shouting out the following words in Hebrew:—"Let the whole world know that the children of Israel have renounced the use of strong liquors."

VICTOR EMMANUEL AND THE POPE.—I hear from good authority that the Sardinian Minister will shortly publish all the correspondence between the Pope and King Victor Emmanuel. From these interesting documents it will appear how strangely the meekness and forbearance of the warrior King contrasts with the arrogance and insolence of the "Servant of Servants of Christ." Nor is it to be wondered at; it is the loser who usually loses his temper.—Times Turin Correspondent.

The veteran Omar Pasha whose name was once as familiar as any in Europe, is about to enter public life again. The Sultan has recalled him from exile, and has appointed him commander of the Roumlia.

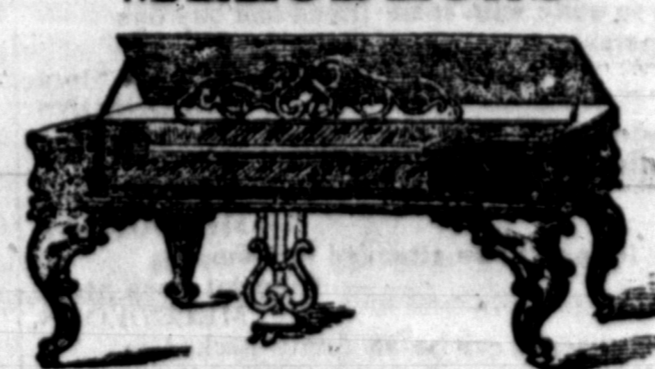
