". " The public buildings of Halifax" he says " are few and shabby." The Province Building is an exception. As the period of the election of the first magistrate of the neighbouring Union (March 1861) approaches, the excited feelings and active efforts of both parties to affect their desired objects, increase in proportion.

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On the Democratic Ticket, so called, appear two leading competitors, Mr. Douglas, of Illinois, one of the most talented and prominent lawyers of the United States, and Mr. Breckenridge, of Pennsylvania (we think). The warmth of their respective adhesion to the interests of Slavery, is the cause of this division of the Democratic party. Douglas, although in the main supporting the Slaveholding policy, is not considered sufficiently thorough for some of the Southern States, be thankfully received and faithfully appropri-Breckenridge, to use the vulgar phrase, "goes the whole hog." Douglas seems, however, in the main, to be the most popular man.

On the Republican side, the leading Candidate is Abraham Lincoln, of Ohio, who will command a large and earnest support from his party. Others have been named on the Anti-Slavery interest, but we do not know whether they will persevere in so impolitic a course as splitting up the party.
