

THE ANTHEM.—Since the first page of our present issue was printed we have learned from Mr. Ackhurst, that the two latter stanzas of the beautiful Anthem sung by the children on the occasion of the Prince's visit, were composed by Judge Bliss. Our estimate of the number of children on the platform it seems, was far too small. Instead of 2500 as we said last week, there appears to have been not less than 4000. The grand spectacle appears to have made a lasting impression on all beholders. Those representatives of the press—who came from the mother country and the United States, were, we learn, highly gratified by this part of the celebration. The gathering of such a number of all classes, including Deaf and Dumb and Africans, and from all denominations, Catholic and Protestant, and with nothing having occurred to mar the pleasantness of the occasion, was, we think, a success equal to any part of the programme.

THE GREAT EASTERN.—On Monday 23rd ult., over 10,000 persons visited the mammoth ship, and on the 25th 19,000. There were 7,000 on board at one time during the afternoon. On Monday the 30th she was to make an excursion trip to Cape May, at \$10 a ticket, the number of visitors she has had since her arrival in New York harbour is about 200,000. It is said she will call at Portland, Me., after leaving New York, before visiting Halifax. It will therefore probably be towards the end of the month before we get a sight of her in the waters of Old Chebucto.

News Summary.

Our latest European intelligence was received by the steamer Albert which arrived at St. John's, Newfoundland, on the 31st ult., with news from Galway to the 24th ult.

Lord Palmerston had announced to Parliament that the Imperial Government had adopted the Report of the Commissioners upon Fortifications and Dockyards. The completion of the proposed changes and additions would cost nine millions sterling. To meet this it was proposed to raise annuities terminable in 30 years. Only two millions a year would thus be required.

The transfer of the Galway Steamers to the Canada Company is cancelled. Great dissatisfaction had arisen in Galway in consequence.

ARRIVAL OF THE EUROPA.

The Royal Mail Steamer arrived about 3 o'clock this morning, with news from Liverpool to the 28th.

The affairs in SYRIA are absorbing public attention. Napoleon is suspected of having secretly fomented the disturbances for the purpose of giving himself a pretext for stepping in to assist Turkey in suppressing them.

French troops had been ordered to Syria, but afterwards the order was countermanded, it is said in consequence of an objection on the part of England.

SICILY is in the hands of Garibaldi. The King of Naples having consented to abandon that part of his dominion wishing to spare the effusion of blood! A truce of six months is proposed which the Sardinian Government have decided by its influence with Garibaldi to support.

It is said that Lord Cowley has proposed to M. Thouvenel a Conference of all the Powers, to be held immediately, for the purpose of settling a common principal of action, and that M. Thouvenel has met the offer with a refusal. The Minister for Foreign Affairs is understood to have said that the question was one not of policy, calling for deliberation, but of humanity, requiring immediate action, and that while they would be debating, blood would be flowing.
